Appeal Filed In Auger Case

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, April 4.—Raoul Mer- cader, on behalf of Louis Auger, former M. P. for Prescott, Ont., filed an appeal at Osgood hall today. Auger was convicted at Ottawa and sentenced by Mr. Justice Wright to nine years in Portsmouth penitentiary for a serious offence against a young girl. Auger subsequently resigned his seat in the House of Com- mons.

The appeal is taken on the ground of misdirection and non-direction in the judge's charge to the jury and that the judge did not sum up the case fairly and that he neglected to present to the jury the defence view and the meaning and effect of the view of the defence.

The defence claims the judge did not analyze the evidence or such evidence as was favorable to the defence in such a way as to insure the jury's appreciation of its effect and importance. He claimed objection was taken to the judge's charge, but the judge declined to recall the jury.

If a new trial is ordered, defence will say that it is to be before a new jury.

Germ of Malaria Cure For Paresis

NEW YORK, APRIL 5.—The anti-vaccinationists received a jolt recently when it was announced that paresis was curable by inoculation with malaria. This discovery is among those listed by the American Association for Medical Progress, for which Dr. Wagner-Juregg, the Viennese psychiatrist, was awarded the Nobel prize in medicine.

For several years, Dr. George H. Kirby, director of the New York State Psychiatric Institute and professor of psychiatry at Columbia, has been doing parallel work in the study of inoculating general paresis patients with malarial bacilli.

According to Dr. Kirby, a little germ parasite whose life, although only 48 hours long, is fully as complicated as our own, may be responsible for curing softening of the brain. General paresis is one of the greatest problems in the study of mental disorders. Speaking of the malignancy of the disease, Dr. Kirby said:

"Heretofore, paresis has always been fatal and death results within three years in the overwhelming majority of cases."

Dr. Kirby carried on his research work at the Manhattan State hospital on Ward's Island, one of those garden spots in the East river.

One-fifth of the men entering the hospital have general paresis. In May, 1923, Dr. Kirby, with the collaboration of Dr. Henry A. Bunker, Jr., began the malaria treatment. During the first year of his experiments 34 definitely psychotic (insane) patients underwent a course of malaria. Of this number 24 are still living and 16 were discharged from the hospital. Fourteen of these sixteen patients have not deteriorated from the state of health to which they advanced under the malaria treatments. In the other cases had the treatment been started at an earlier stage of the disease irreparable cerebral damage might have been forestalled and those who showed definite mental improvement might thus have been brought to a complete cure. The important fact is that these results have remained unmodified over a four and one-half year period.

In a recent report to the academy of medicine, Dr. Kirby further stated that of 156 test cases made since 1923 on patients in all stages of the disease "one-third achieved a complete remission of mental symptoms, gained good insight, were free from mental defect symptoms, have been discharged from the hospital and have returned to work." Of the remainder of the patients a large per cent. manifested a definite response to the treatment by the abolition of most of their mental symptoms.

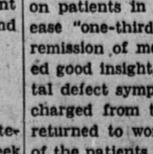
