THERE were 28 passengers and another large load of general freight up to West River ports on the S. S. City of London yesterday afternoon. The return cargo consisted of 10 barrels produce and 6 cases eggs.

THE heavy north east wind of last night threatened to make a total wreck of the Acadan, Capt. Doucette, ashore at Rustico East flats. She is owned by J. J. Gallant, Rustico, and has 110 tons of coal on board.

A St. John despatch says:—The story of the wreck of the Call was a cruel hoax. Arch. Frazer, of Chatham, the owner of the boat, which is worth \$6,000, received a telegram asking him to go to Prince Edward Island where the boat was. Before leaving he seems to have given out the story which created the panic. No one seems to know why he did it, though some suppose that he must have been drinking. The story caused great anxiety at Chatham among friends of those on board, until word came by wire that the Call was all right. Frazer is not supposed to have a son on board the boat.
