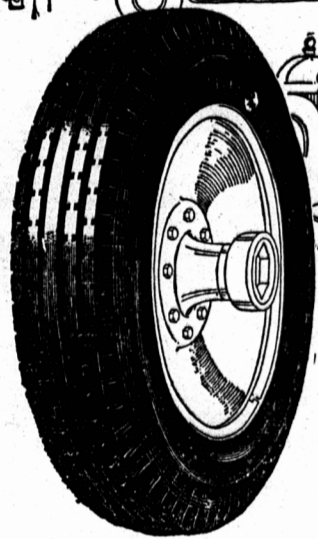
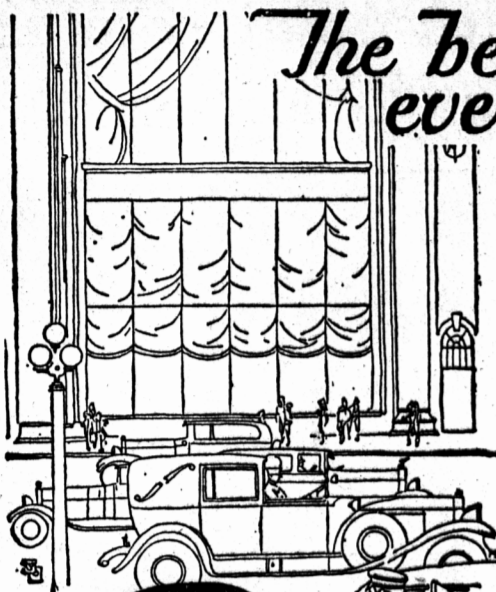

They were each fined \$50 and costs or three months in jail and were given five days in which to pay the fine. —REACTORS ALMOST NIL.—Dr. Nichols, Dominion Veterinary Inspector, who has had charge of the inspection of cattle throughout the Island, left on Monday for his home in Ontario. He is accompanied by his wife and little son, George, who have been staying in Summerside, the guests of Miss Viola MacKenzie. Dr. Nichols reports that there are only 147 reactors on the Island, out of a total of 93,000 tested cattle, which is a little less than a tenth of one per cent, the smallest count in any one area, which is an extremely satisfactory state of affairs. Men have commenced retesting the cattle on the infected premises, which they do sixty days after the first test and return again in six months time. There are about sixty-seven infected premises on the Island. S.

The contracting parties were Mr. Harold Nesbitt, formerly of Tynes Valley, and Miss Olive Maynard of Port Hill. MAIL PLANE IS DESTROYED IN CRASH AT SIMLA  
SIMLA, India, Sept. 7.—The Eng-

land-to-India mail plane crashed today at Jask, Persia, killing three persons and injuring two. The bodies and mail were burned.
