NOTED FRENCH SCIENTIST RIDICULES MINE SHAFT MARS VIEW SCHEME

Abbe Moreaux Says Prof. Macafee's Photographs Might Bring Planet Within 1,000-mile Range—Calls Canals Natural Valleys.

PARIS, Sept. 26.—French astronomer and especially Abbe Moreaux, director of the Bureau Central de Recherches Astronomiques, are heaping ridicule on Prof. Macafee's calculations that by using a mine shaft as a telescope, the planet Mars will be able to be seen beyond the horizon. "As a matter of fact," Abbe Moreaux said, "Mars would be brought, perhaps about a thousand miles from his vision, but at a distance of a thousand miles, what can be seen beyond the horizon? The mine shaft, which has already been well defined? "As to canals on Mars, we are as sure as we will ever be that they are natural valleys some three hundred miles wide. It is unlikely, even on such an angle of planet, that they have ever been worked by human beings."

CASUALTIES IN BELFAST

BELFAST, Sept. 26.—Two persons were killed and thirty-six were wounded in rioting here last night during which bombs were thrown. Two children playing in the streets were wounded by stray bullets during the affray. Eight persons were wounded and taken to Victoria Hospital and the other eighteen to Women's Hospitals.

Abbe Moreaux is preparing a paper regarding Mars, which for years has been a subject of special study by him. In this, he intends to refute the popular theory that Mars is inhabited by a superdeveloped race. He contends that the rarified atmosphere there, which he estimates is comparable to that existing ten miles from the earth, would not permit human life to exist.

TRANS-ATLANTIC PASSENGER TRADE TO BE SERVED BY ONE-CLASS VESSELS

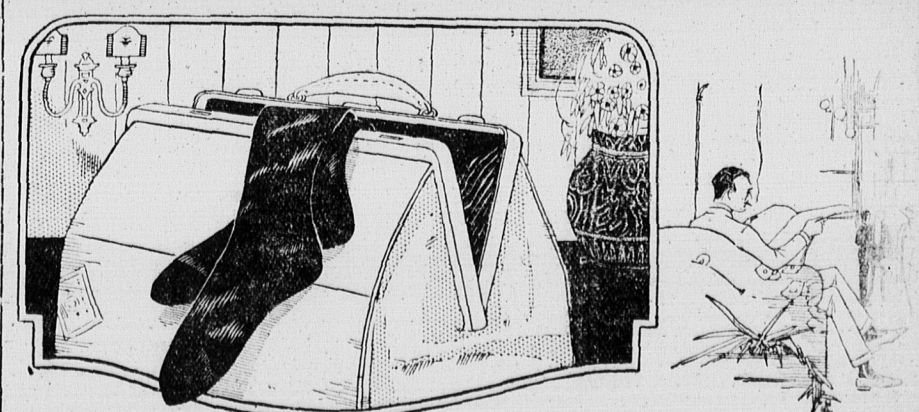

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Two Americans, arraigned here for insulting behavior, paid fines of 5 shillings each, and received a lesson in good manners from Justice Booth, of the Thames Police Court. He was somewhat nettled when one of the prisoners declared: "If this damned country paid all it owes it would be bankrupt!" To this the Justice replied: "You are, after all, partaking for a time of the hospitality of this country so far as it will go. You should not throw our poverty in our face. It may be true, if it is, all the more painful, but it will be much better off if you pay 5 shillings each."
