SEVERAL WAYS TO SERVE POTATOES

The potato has fewer ups and downs than most of the articles in our daily diet. Its prices does not soar out of sight along with that of meat and eggs, and it has never been accused of harboring harmful germs. Taken to Europe from America by Sir Walter Raleigh, or, as another account says, by Sir Frances Drake, in the sixteenth century, the potato seems to have been regarded at first as a curiosity, but the failure of the grain crops in Ireland in 1772 made the food possibilities more important, and it has ever since been popular in the country. The potato is composed of 78 per cent. water, 18 per cent. starch, but only a little over two per cent. protein. Hence the use of eggs, meat, fish, etc., with potatoes to make up the deficiency in fat. There are dozens of ways of serving potatoes. Following are a few.

POTATO-S A' LA HOLLANDAISE.

Parse and cut potatoes in one-fourth inch slices, shape with a French vegetable cutter, or cut in one-half inch cubes. Cover two cups potato with white stock cook until soft, and drain. Cream one-third cup butter, add one tablespoon lemon juice, one-half teaspoon salt, and a few grains of cayenne. Add to the potatoes, cook three minutes, and add one-half tablespoon finely chopped parsley.

POTATO OMELET

Take a large, freshly baked potato and scoop out the inside with a spoon. Beat the outside smooth and mix it with half a tablespoonful of paprika or white pepper, one-half teaspoonful of salt, a dessertspoonful of lemon juice and the yolks of four eggs. A minute or two before the omelet is to be fried fold in the whites of the eggs, beaten to a stiff froth. Fry in a well greased, very hot pan and serve immediately on a hot dish.

HUNGARIAN POTATOES

Wash, pare and cut potatoes in small cubes to make three cups. Parboil three minutes and drain. Add one-third cup butter and cook until the potatoes are soft and slightly browned. Melt two tablespoons butter, add a few drops onion juice and two tablespoons flour, and pour on gradually one cup of hot milk. Cook five minutes. Season with salt and paprika, pour over the potatoes and sprinkle with finely chopped parsley.

POTATO RIBBONS

Potatoes served in ribbon like strips criss-crossed, lattice fashion, are decorative when one wants to do something a little extra for luncheon. In this case, wash and peel a half dozen large potatoes and let them lie in cold water for a few moments. Then with a sharp vegetable knife cut round and round like an apple, keeping the strips one width. Don't make them too thin or they will break. Fry in plenty of hot fat for about eight minutes or until lightly browned. Drain on a wire sieve or soft paper and sprinkle with salt and pepper, and serve on a hot dish.

DELMONICO POTATOES

Reheat two cups of boiled potatoes

CHAMBERY POTATOES

Mash, pare and thinly slice potatoes, using a vegetable slicer. Let stand one-half hour in cold water, then drain, and dry between towels. Arrange in layers in a well buttered iron frying pan, having the pan three-fourths full, seasoning each layer with salt and pepper and brushing over with melted butter. Cook in a moderate oven until soft and well browned.

FRUIT CAKE I.

Two lbs. sugar, 2 lbs. butter, 4 1/2 lbs. currants, 4 lbs. raisins, 2 lbs. minced figs, 2 lbs. almonds, 1 lb. mixed peel, 1 1/2 doz. eggs, 4 t. cloves, 4 t. cinnamon, 1 t. nutmeg, 1 t. allspice, 1 cup milk, flour to thicken, 3 t. baking powder.

FRUIT CAKE II.

One lb. butter, 2 lbs. raisins, 2 lbs. currants, 1 lb. flour, 1 lb. peel, 1 lb. almonds, 1 lb. dates, 1 lb. brown sugar, 2 lb. syrup, 3 t. baking powder, 10 eggs. Mix butter and sugar to cream, then add eggs, flour and baking powder, lastly fruit. Bake three or four hours in a slow oven.

Care must be taken not to make the cakes too thick, as then they will be dry. Of course, they must be very carefully baked in a slow, even oven.

GRAZING ON DOMINION FOREST RESERVES

The new regulations for Dominion Forest Reserves, which recently went into force, make full provision for the grazing of live stock on such reserves as frequently contain considerable areas of grass-land. The method to be followed is similar to that in successful operation on the National Forests in the United States. The number and kind of stock to be admitted into each reserve is determined each year by the Director of Forestry according to the capacity of the reserve.

In case of many applications for grazing rights on any one reserve, the number of stock which any one person is entitled to pasture is fixed by a "grazing unit," based on the number of stock which can be carried during the winter by a homestead or small ranch on the object being to give settlers without large grazing areas of their own, the same facilities as those who have such areas. But where there is no danger of overgrazing, the number of stock grazed by any one person on a reserve may considerably exceed this "grazing unit."

Application for grazing permits must be on special forms and should be made to the Director or local forest officer before the first of March. Small resident farmers who are dependent on the forest reserve for range for their stock receive first consideration. The Director of Forestry fixes the dues for grazing permits for each forest reserve, but the minimum dues for cattle or horses
