ATTENTION FARMERS

The following regulations have been agreed to by the below mentioned dealers.

The minimum cash payment and regulations required on time sales of farm implements and tractors remains the same as enacted by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board in 1941 namely:

All time sales must have a minimum cash payment of 40% of the purchase price. Where any trade-in is taken by dealer the allowance for same is to be deducted from the purchase price and the cash payment computed as 40% of balance. Full settlement must be made by purchaser before time of delivery either in cash or at least 40% cash and signed notes for the balance.

Machines cannot be left on trial. When demonstrations are necessary they must be settled for or taken back on delivery date. Customers are fully protected by warranty on purchasers order form.

WE WISH PARTICULARLY TO DRAW YOUR ATTENTION TO REPAIR PARTS.

All dealers are endeavouring to provide an adequate supply of repair parts which necessitates a great outlay of cash to keep in stock. Therefore, all repairs are sold on a strictly over the counter cash basis. This rule must be strictly followed and applies to everyone. Due to the present conditions we would urge all customers to check over your machines early so as to avoid disappointment in getting repairs on time.

Sir—Enclosed you will find copy of letter from the Summerside Youth Centre Incorporated to the Mayor and Council of Summerside. As the Town authorities have advised that the monthly grant of \$125.00, for supervision of playgrounds, will cease with the June payment of this year, we can only presume that the Town Council have other plans for the care of playgrounds. The public at large, having generously donated to our funds for the purpose of equipping and supervising the playgrounds, are entitled to the facts which lead up to the present situation and we would ask you to publish these letters for their information.

To the Mayor and Town Council, Town of Summerside, P.E.I.:
Gentlemen:

In the local newspapers of recent date there was published an account of a special meeting of the Town Council at which the control of the property to the east of the High School property on Green Street was placed under the "Parks" Committee of your Council.

May we be advised if this published report is correct as we have on our files the following letter: 25th May, 1945.
Summerside Youth Centre Inc., Summerside, P. E. I.

Dear Sirs:
"With reference to your application to Council for permission to use the ball grounds adjoining the High School property for your Youth Training activities, we wish to advise you that the Mayor and Town Council have decided to grant your request, giving your organization control of these grounds, providing the activities are carried on to the satisfaction of the Town Council, and subject to any other essential use for which said land might be required."

We have had no advice from your body that the control of these grounds, as granted to us in the above letter, has been rescinded and are at loss to understand this account and certain activities which have taken place on the grounds in question since that date.

In the published report is a statement to the effect that it had been established to the satisfaction of the Council that the S. Y. C. I. had not carried on their activities to your satisfaction. May we ask who established the so-called facts upon which the Council is supposed to have based its decision, and what opportunity was afforded the S. Y. C. I. to indicate the actual scope of its operations, so that a fair appraisal could have been made in the matter?

We request this information as we feel that, having solicited some \$4800.00 from the general public to be spent on playgrounds for children of school age, we will be compelled to make some public explanation as to why we spent from \$600.00 to \$800.00 of these funds on the ground in question without having control of the same.

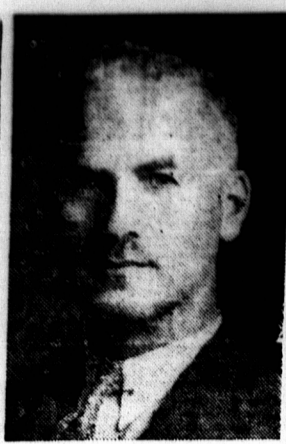
To assist you to understand why we request this information may we give a brief summary of how our organization came into existence and its aims and objects:

In the fall of 1943 the Service Clubs of this Town were rather concerned with the state of juvenile delinquency in Summerside. A committee formed from members of the Rotary Club, Y's Men's Club and the Knights of Columbus waited on the Town Council requesting that some action be taken to provide supervised playgrounds for children of school age.

After several meetings it was agreed by the Town Council that they would make a grant of \$125.00 per month, starting December 12th, 1943, toward expenses of supervising and operating playgrounds and that the committee would become responsible for the equipping and supervision of such playgrounds.

On December 14th, 1943 Mr. Patrick Ryan was hired as Welfare Officer, with supervision over playgrounds.

On January 5th, 1944 the Summerside Board of School Trustees

granted permission for the Committee to install playground equipment on their property to the east of the school and to equip one large room in the basement of the school building as a gymnasium. The Committee being aware that they would have to raise funds by public subscription decided to incorporate in order that donors to the fund could claim deduction for their donations from their income tax.

Consequently on March 20th, 1944 the Summerside Youth Centre was incorporated and the Committee handed their duties over to that body. On May 19th, 1944 Mr. Patrick Ryan was appointed Truant Officer in conjunction with his duties as Welfare Officer.

On May 25th, 1945 we received the letter from Mayor Arnett quoted above, granting control of the lower field at school. On March 18th, 1946 Mayor Arnett met with our directors and verbally confirmed our control over the ground in question. This confirmation was asked for as the S. Y. C. I. did not wish to make further expenditures on this property unless their control was assured.

During the Spring and Summer of 1946 we spent some \$500.00 on this property on the strength of the above letter and the Mayor's verbal assurance of our continued control, this amount of work would not have been done on this property without that assurance.

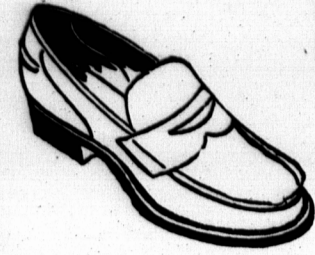
In brief the S. Y. C. I. were subsidized by the Town Council to equip and supervise playgrounds, including lower field at school. This subsidization, in effect, was granted to relieve the Council of this responsibility and to place it in the hands of an organization who were interested in the welfare of children of school age.

If the published report is correct, we can only assume that our work has not been satisfactory to the Council (though we have never received any official word to that effect nor even of complaint) and that therefore, the grounds being no longer available to us, we will have to report such failure to the three Service Clubs and the public in general of the circumstances and consider what disposal will have to be made of the equipment and work made possible by their generosity; contemplating as well the discontinuance of our attempted service to the School children of the Town which we had undertaken at the request of the Council.
