ron. On Dec. 1, 1938, Miss Beattie
accepted the charge of the newly
established Brockton Hospital,
serving as its first superintendent.
In March of the following year,
1939, she organized the Brockton
Hospital school of nursing. During
the sixteen and one-half years un-
der her direction and guidance,
progress was made and new
buildings were added and equip-
ment was purchased. The Brockton
nursing school was also built by the
late Daniel W. Field during her lead-
ership. She retired in 1952.

"While at Brockton Hospital,
Miss Beattie became interested
with a group of 20 other members
of the nursing profession in form-
ing a corporation under the name
of the Massachusetts State Nurses
Association. The purpose of the
organization was first, to secure
by legislation, the protection of
the nursing profession for the bene-
fit of the public, the physician and
the nurse; second, to formulate a
code of ethics for nurses of this
State; third, for working for high-
er standards and a uniform cur-
riculum in hospital education. Af-
ter this she went abroad with a
group of other senior nurses and
visited most of the important hos-
pitals in Europe.

past two weeks has been under-
going treatment in the Western

"Following her retirement from
the active nursing profession she
took a four-year course at Boston
University in religious art, in
which she was profoundly inter-
