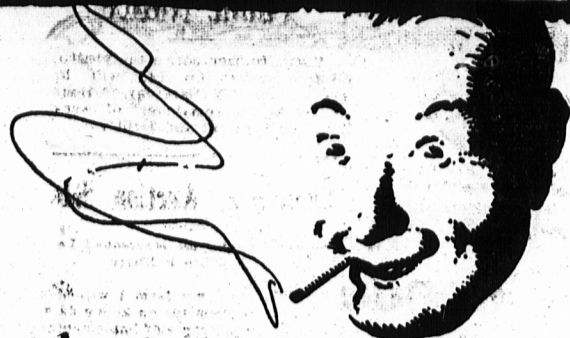

Yesterday afternoon the Presbytery went into conference on the forward movement subject.

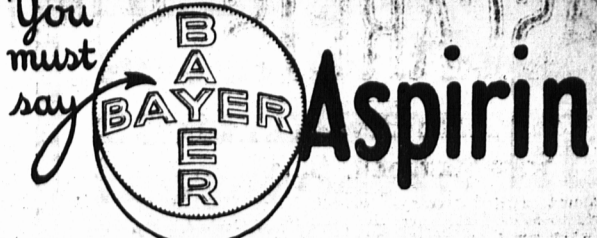
Rev. John M. Murchison has been appointed Inter-Moderator of the Kensington charge.
