RURAL MAIL DELIVERY. On the 1st October the new Regulations under which the couriers on rural routes must sell postage stamps, and also purchase money orders and postal notes for the patrons, who may request them, will go into effect. The courier will have to provide ready out of his own funds with a sufficient supply of stamps from the distributing office of his route and the Postmaster of that office must see that this is strictly carried out by the courier and if not to promptly report the fact to the Inspector. As regards money orders and postal notes, the Department has prepared blank forms of application for same in bundles of 10. A bundle will be placed in every rural box, so that patrons may fill them out as desired by them. The application properly filled out is handed to the courier who signs a receipt for the money received. The courier will, on reaching the distributing office, purchase the money order or postal note and take it to the purchaser's box on the next trip. If prepaid, by the patrons, there will be no objection to the latter giving the courier the open letter, in which the money order or postal note is to be enclosed and thus forward same to the addressee at once. Blank forms of application will be carried by the courier, so that he may be able to meet any demands from the patrons of his route. The courier must also accept for registration any article offered to him, properly prepaid as such by any of the patrons on his route, and must give a receipt for same from a small book, which will be furnished him for that purpose. As regards the delivery of registered articles, a notice will be sent by the Postmaster of the distributing office when such article reaches his office, that it will be sent by the following trip of the courier and advising the patron to meet him at the box and give a receipt for the article on a card carried by the courier. If the patron fails to meet the courier, the registered article shall be taken back to the distributing office and a second notice sent to the patron telling him that such article will be held until he has either called for it or given further instructions as to its disposal. A large number of rural routes have been opened throughout the Provinces during the past few months and the Department are closing a number of the postoffices on these routes. As rural delivery is becoming more and more extended it is particularly requested that all patrons should have their mail properly addressed in order to ensure prompt delivery. (Canadian Press)

WANT CENSORSHIP OF ALL THEATRES. TORONTO, September 27.—At the opening session of the annual meeting of the Methodist department of temperance and moral reform, a lively discussion over the class of plays presented in Canadian theatres took place, and the general opinion of the delegates, who hail from every province in the Dominion and from Newfoundland, was that the majority of them were sadly in need of censorship. The power of the stage to disseminate useful information and to educate the public by the presentation of the proper kind of entertainment was dilated upon at length, and a strong stand was taken on the question. It was recommended to the Dominion moral and social reform council that an appeal be made to the federal parliament to institute a censorship for all theatres and for every troupe, company or association in the Dominion. BERTIN, September 27.—Electric sleep, to be turned on or off at will, is the alluring promise held out to sufferers from sleeplessness by Dr. Nagelschmidt, a German physician, who describes his invention in the Berliner Klinische Wochenschrift. So far the electric sleep has been produced only in rabbits and dogs, but the experiments on animals have been so free from evil effects that Dr. Dr. Nagelschmidt thinks that human beings can be subjected to the same treatment without danger. Sleep is produced by a new form of electric current devised by Dr. Nagelschmidt. When it is applied to the base of the brain, he says, a narcotic effect is caused which can be maintained as long as is desired. The animals on which the experiments were tried returned to consciousness and entirely normal conditions within a minute or two. Dr. Nagelschmidt declares that the new method also has power of eliminating pain in any portion of the human body. A condition is produced in which even incisions of the surgeon's knife are not felt as long as the patient remains in the electrified state. WILL HOLD IMPORTANT SERIES. OTTAWA, September 27.—A series of very important cabinet councils will be held next week beginning Monday morning. It is expected that the question of naval aid will be under consideration. MORMONS KIDNAP AN IRISH HEIRESS. DUBLIN, Sept. 25.—A special notice on the part of the chief inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary has left for Salt Lake City, Utah, to investigate an alleged case of Mormon kidnaping reported by the police commissioner at Belfast. It is charged that a young heiress was spirited away by the "Cooneyites," as the Irish Mormons are called, kept in confinement in this country
