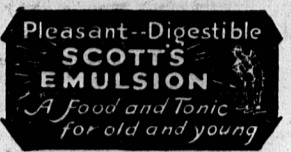

Always in the best of health, her death came very suddenly after an illness of little more than a week, at the early age of twenty-eight and on the fifth anniversary of her wedding. She was the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Kelzer, now residents of York and like her parents was a zealous attendant of the United Church there.

By this sudden passing of a kind and loving daughter, wife and mother is left to mourn a sorrowing husband who has been for some time himself under strict medical care, one son Harvey, three years old, her parents and two brothers Lester of York and Earl of Charlottetown.

Deep sympathy is extended to all the bereaved especially the husband and his aged father now left alone in the home. The funeral which was held on Thursday Oct. 3rd, was one of the largest ever seen in the district.

The services were conducted by her pastor Rev. P. E. Boothroyd, both in the home and at the York cemetery where all that was mortal was gently laid to rest till that great day of reunion when there will be no more sorrow nor parting.

MRS. JAMES E. MACDONALD

The death of Mrs. James E. MacDonald, on September 23rd, 1929, removed from Cardigan, one who for over half a century has been a leading figure in the community.

Mrs. MacDonald was born at Orwell, September 18th, 1851, the daughter of Patrick Stephens and Mary Mathew, both of Irish descent. On July 4th, 1877 she was united in the holy bonds of matrimony with James E. MacDonald, by the late Bishop McIntyre of Charlottetown. During her twenty-six years of happy wedded life she was his devoted and loyal companion. His interests whether political, commercial or social were always her interests. During the many years he was representative for the Cardigan district in the Provincial Legislature, she assisted him valiantly in all his activities. Visiting politicians were always warmly welcomed and royally entertained, at their typically Christian home, in those days, when facilities for travel were not as they are today.

Although in falling health for the past year, through repeated heart attacks, her sudden death was a severe shock to all her friends. During that last fatal attack she had the happiness of having her pastor, Rev. M. J. Rooney, administer the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church, and commit her soul into the care of the Most High. Around her death-bed were also assembled, in prayer for her happy death and favorable judgment, her grief-stricken sister, nephew, nieces, doctor and nurses. All that could be done to prevent the Hand of Death from touching her, was nobly accomplished, but in the end all were forced to submit to God's inevitable decree.

Mrs. MacDonald was one of those rare types of womanhood, whose equal is difficult to find. She possessed all the virtues in a remarkable degree. She was always the real lady. She could please people of every station in life by her kind words and deeds. She was sympathetic and always ready to apply the balm of consolation in all afflictions, which came to her notice. But outstanding among the virtues which caused every one to respect her, were her charity, humility and spirit of sacrifice.

But for those benefits which she showered so abundantly she sought no created honours. The glory of God was foremost in her mind and she did not wish to have her sacrifices, in any way, tarnished. In those good deeds, self was entirely forgotten. She only wished to render service, and that was given always without reserve, with great diligence and the utmost exactness. Mrs. James, as she was favorably known, has passed away, but she will long be cherished in the memories of those who knew and consequently loved her. Her beautiful example will always be to them an inspiration to lead an honest, God-fearing straightforward life. Her cheerful submission to difficulties and disappointments will make theirs, lose all bitterness.

During life, despite her numerous duties, she frequently visited the Catholic Church of Cardigan. In fact she has been intimately connected with that church ever since its inception over fifty years ago. There by earnest prayer and frequent reception of the Sacraments she found the strength necessary to lead such a saintly and exemplary life of sacrifice. There she took special delight in preparing God's holy altar for His daily visits and His permanent sojourn. There also she helped the various parish priests instruct the little ones in the way of salvation. Without doubt, the Giver of Perfect Gifts, has in return prepared and placed her in possession of happiness for all Eternity. Her funeral to All Saint's Church on September 26th., was very largely

attended. The church was filled to capacity with those who came to pay their last respects. The High Mass of Requiem was sung by Rt. Rev. Mgr. McLean, P. A., V. G., assisted by Rev. J. C. McDonald and Rev. P. Walsh, as Deacon and Subdeacon. Rev. J. A. Murphy, rector of St. Dunstan's University, was Master of Ceremonies. Eleven other priests from various parts of the province assisted.

The committal services at the grave were celebrated by the pastor Rev. M. J. Rooney. A tooth nine inches long was dug up recently by excavators working on the site of the entomological building at Canberra, Australia, and it is believed to have been that of a prehistoric marsupial.

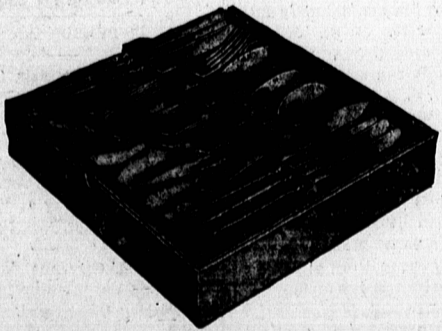
