ATTAINS WORLD'S RECORD.—Pride Bess' Dream a three year old Ayrshire heifer owned by Ings & Son, Mt. Herbert, has recently completed her record of 14,379 lbs. of milk, 753 lbs. fat on twice a day milking. A new Canadian and World's Record for butter fat production has therefore been made for three year olds. The former Canadian record was held by Primrose (Dom. Experimental Farm, St. Ann's) with 746 lbs. of fat. Whilst the American record in the Junior 3 year olds class was 668 lbs. fat. Pride Bess' Dream is a Junior 3 year old being 3 years, 87 days old at commencement of test. Her average yearly test was 5.24 percent. She is now being shown with the herd of Messrs. Ings at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto.
