"FURRY ENGINEERS" (Elinor Wendy in Our Dumb Animals)

Just to see the way he slips his head tall down on the water ought to indicate to you that Mr. Castor Canadensis, the Canadian beaver, is used to getting things done in a hurry.

First an engineer, then a game warden, he's no loafer, this furry fellow. In fact he's as busy as a beaver. The link between ducks and beavers is a simple one.

In late summer ducks are temporarily deprived of the cover of reeds and grasses which they have learned to use their wings and the mature parent birds have "cast their quills" and with them the important primary wing feathers.

Here where the beaver exercises his engineering talents. While storing food in the form of luscious spruce twigs which are dragged underwater to furnish many a winter meal, Mr. Beaver damns uplets to ponds and lakes and stops trickling streams which weave through the marshland.

The trouble with Gordon Lake is that it is shallow. For the last decade this traditional nesting place of the Canada goose has been a death trap to them. Driven by blind instinct to return to the same locality every year, a trait which was discovered by bird-banding.

- 1. Standard Lunch Box
2. Thermos bottle — for soups and beverages.
3. Glass jar with screw top — for puddings and fruit. Clean jam or marmalade jars are ideal for this purpose.
4. Paper cups — for salads
5. War paper — for salads and sandwiches
6. Spoons and/or forks
