FACE INJURED

Labor matters loomed large in the
city's news, and speculative quarters
expressed their uncertainty as to the
outcome of current differences by
moderate offerings in the security
markets. Stocks had a rather active
dip around noon, but most of the
day their decline was slight.

SISTER PASSED AWAY

As was the case Saturday, indus-
trial stocks had the largest average
decline of the three major groups,
motors and steel being especially
heavy. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Cen-
tral Motors, Chrysler, and Nation-
al Steel were down one to more than
two points.

MISSIONARY MEETING

Steel trade reviews have been say-
ing that orders from railroads and
miscellaneous have been offsetting
smaller takings by automobile
manufacturers who face labor
uncertainties. This week's pro-
duction average compiled by the
American Iron and Steel Institute
would appear to bear out this view
since the figure has risen to 46.8
percent of capacity from 46.2 per-
cent a week ago. The magazine
"Steel" reports that although ship-
ment of shipments to automobile
makers have been relatively few,
"higher specifications are being is-
sued."
