RIFLEMEN FAVORED WITH GOOD WEATHER FOR 2ND DAY'S SHOOT

Three matches shot yesterday resulted in keen competition - Lt. F. G. Kennedy and Percy Hooper the winners.

Beautiful weather greeted the riflemen yesterday and the three matches shot resulted in very keen competition. In the morning the Moore & McLeod Match seven rounds each at 200 and 500 yards was fired. It was won by Percy Hooper, Milton, with 68 points out of a possible 70.

IN THE AFTERNOON the Lieutenant Governor's Match, 7 rounds at 600 yards was shot. Lt. F. G. Kennedy won with an excellent 34 out of 35 points. Capt. A. W. Allan had the same score but his losing point was a little nearer the end of the score so he had to take second place.
