## RIGHELIEU AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

Those who braved the storm last evening to witness the great drama Richeleu as presented by the Edouard D'Oize Company were amply repaid. The audience was a fair one, in view of the most disagreeable weather and the depressing effect of the great sorrow which weighs upon the public mind. The impersonation of the great Cardinal is a difficult task for so youthful an actor as Mr. D'Oize, who is yet on the younger side of thirty. Yet he appeared last evening as venerable in years, as physically feeble, as astute, and as strong in purpose as we can imagine the real Richeleu to have been. His make-up and impersonation of the character left nothing to be desired. Mr. D'Oize more-over rose to a thrilling height in that stupendous climax in which he drew "the awful circle of the church" about his fair ward to protect her. Miss Erle played the part of Julie with easy and artistic grace. The Mauprat of Mr. Leland Webb might be thought a trifle too boisterous, though his role is an exiting one. It contrasted somewhat strongly with the smooth but rather tame presentation of Baradas, which was taken at short notice by a member of the Company not announced in the cast. Mr. Montgomery's Joseph was a good piece of work which won increasing favor as the play developed. Mr. Parmer presented the weak and youthful King acceptably. Altogether the play was admirably put on and the audience showed how greatly it was appreciated. The Company is really a capable one and deserving of liberal patronage. Tonight they will put on the old favorite Don Caesar de Bazan. At Saturday's matinee the engaging farce-comedy, The Man in Black, will be given.

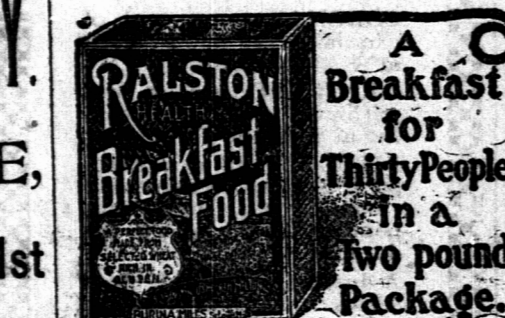
