PEMERROKE Ont., Oct. 19 (CP)—Mr. Justice D.P.J. Kelly today granted a charge of murder against Sgt. I. Wilfred Bradley of the Royal Canadian Engineers, stationed at Petawawa Camp Ont., after the grand jury had returned a bill on the indictment against Bradley.

He was charged with killing Cpl. P.F. Taylor at Petawawa Camp, Ont., April 23, 1943, while on duty and at a night session, and their finding was presented to Mr. Justice Kelly today.

Bradley was arrested at Charlottetown in July on another charge and will be returned there to face trial for it.
