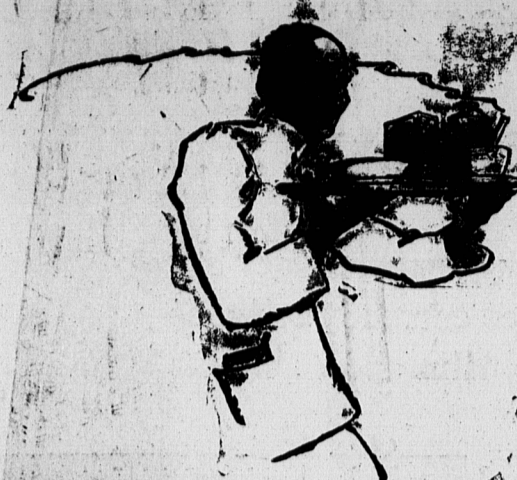

On unday afternoons, to talk of the new shop; the guests from town;

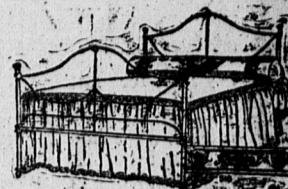

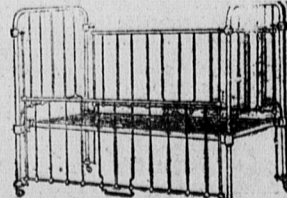
