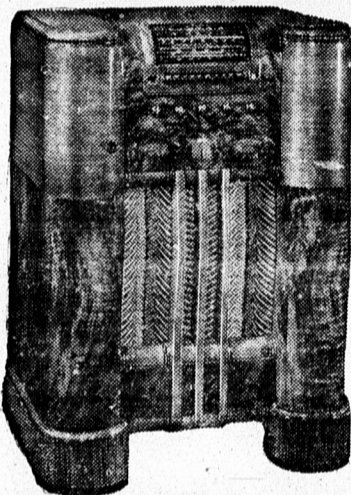

Institute District  
Convention

The Supervisor suggested to the meeting that we change the date of convention from October to June or a time suitable to the people so as to have this convention follow in line with the other conventions. It was moved and seconded that we change our convention to an earlier date. The matter was then discussed. Following the discussion it was moved by Mrs. Edgar Hertz and seconded by Mrs. Gerald Hooper, that a committee meet with the supervisor at a later date, after the matter had been more fully discussed at the different Institutes.
