**Demonstration Of New Chrysler And Plymouth Autos**

A most interesting series of talks describing the construction of the Chrysler and Plymouth motor cars was presented last evening by Mr. F. R. McInnis, local dealer, at the Quack Hotel.

The program opened with a feature entitled "Hell Drivers," which illustrated the grueling tests to which two stock model Chryslers were put by Barney Oldfield and Billy Arnold, famous race drivers. The tests included driving at all speeds over rough, dusty, frozen, and snow covered surfaces as well as through streams and was climaxed by twice rolling one of the cars down a steep hill. The car made 12 complete revolutions and was still able to be driven under its own power.

Another picture described the events leading up to the perfection of the new air flow Chrysler, which is the result of scientific streamlining.

A third, entitled "Three A Minute" showed the details of construction in the Chrysler plant describing the manufacture and assembly of the parts until the complete auto is driven from the line.

The final scenes were devoted to illustrating the fine points of the new Plymouth.

The demonstration was staged under the direction of Mr. George Claiborne, who at the close of the program announced that these models would be on display at Mr. McInnis's in a few days.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**MR. JAMES WADDELL**

There passed away at Victoria on Feb. 12, 1934, after a lingering illness, Mr. James Waddell, aged 78 years.

The late Mr. Waddell was well and favorably known to a wide circle of friends and acquaintances who will long remember his many acts of kindness, very often to his own inconvenience. Being a skilled veterinarian he was often called upon at all hours of the day or night to attend to a sick animal. He was rarely known to refuse and then only too ill to leave his home. On more than one occasion he arose from a sick-bed to help a neighbor. It is by these and other deeds demonstrating his large-hearted sympathy, that his memory will be cherished.

In his earlier years he was a successful farmer at Westmoreland until failing health compelled him to sell his large property. He then bought a small farm at Victoria, about sixteen years ago, and he had resided there ever since.

He was for over forty years a valued member of the Orange Association being one of the oldest members of Prince Arthur L. O. L. at Crapaud.

Although he had never made a public profession of religion, being a man of retiring disposition, yet he had deep religious convictions. Those who attended him during his last illness will not soon forget the fervent prayer he offered.

Besides his widow he is survived by one son and two daughters, namely William and Pearl (Mrs. Snow) in the U.S., and Vina (Mrs. Lowther), postmistress at Victoria.

The funeral services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. George Ayres, of the United Church, who often visited him before his decease. The interment was in the Presbyterian cemetery at Tryon.

**Hopes Wane For Safety Of Three Ontario Youths**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LUNenburg, N. S., March 6.—Forty-five days out of Lunenburg during their sailing venture to Bermuda, three Ontario youths on their sturdy little schooner-style craft, Ospepe have not yet been sighted nor has any word been received here by Capt. Angus Walters, who aided the youths in preparing for the holiday cruise.

The 48-foot vessels with Henry Lebat of London, Ont., at the helm, were shipped out through a narrow channel of Lunenburg Harbor, bound for the British West Indies. With him were George Keiller and Ernest Balson, both of Hamilton, Ont. They promised Capt. Walters, skipper of the Bluenose, champion of the North Atlantic fishing fleet, they would cable immediately after they touched land, but Capt. Walters said today he had received no word. The Ospepe, he said, carried word to last his little crew for about three or six weeks but only enough fuel to feed her motor about 10 days.

Tuesday, March 6th, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, addressing himself to the Clerk of the House, proposed to the House for Speaker, Herby Brown, Esq., Sunnyside, and moved seconded by Hon. Mr. Sharpe that Mr. Brown take the chair as Speaker.

The Clerk, having declared Mr. Brown duly elected, the latter was taken out of his place by Hon. Mr. MacMillan and the Hon. Mr. Sharp and conducted to the chair.

Standing on the upper step he addressed the House as follows:

"It is my pleasure today to express my grateful acknowledgement for the honor conferred on me by the House in electing me to be its Speaker. Conscious as I am of my comparative inexperience in parliamentary procedure, I should have hesitated to accept a position involving so much responsibility, were it not for the fact that I know I shall be able at all times to rely with confidence upon the assistance and the kindness of every member of the Assembly, again thanking you, I now submit myself to the House."

The House responded to the speech of the Speaker with a standing ovation. Hon. Mr. MacMillan, seconded by Mr. Bethune, Lieut. Andrew C. MacEachern, M.C. of York Point, was appointed Sergeant at Arms.

The Speaker-elect then left the chair.

His Honour entered the House preceded by his personal staff and followed by Brigadier H. F. H. Herbage, O.M.G., D.S.O., M.C., District Officer Commanding Military District No. 6; Colonel U. G. Dawson, V.D.; Lieut. Colonel F. I. Andrew, M.M., V.D., A.D.C.; Lieut. Col. E. H. Strong, M.C., V.D.; Lieut. Col. J. Blake, V.D.; Major H. T. Cook, M.C., the R.C.R.; Major T. B. Rogers, V.D.; Major P. S. Fielding, M.M.; Lieut. Commander G. F. Buntaine, R.C.N.Y.R.; Inspector James Phipps, R.C.M.P.

After the Lieutenant Governor had arrived, the Speaker-elect addressed His Honour to the following effect:

"May I please your Honour, it is my duty to inform you that the Legislative Assembly have been pleased to elect me to the important and honourable position of their Speaker and I am pleased to be presented for your Honour's approval."

"The Clerk of the House then said: "Mr. Strong: I am commanded by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to inform you that he is fully sensible to your seal for the public service and of your sufficiency to execute the duties of the office to which you have been elected by the Legislative Assembly and that he does now readily approve of their choice and allow and confirm you to be their Speaker."

The Speaker then addressed His Honour to the following effect: "May I please your Honour, your Honour having been pleased to approve of the choice of the Assembly in electing me to be their Speaker, it now becomes my duty in the name and behalf of the Assembly to claim and demand that they have all their ancient and accustomed rights and privileges, especially freedom from arrest, freedom of speech in debate, and that you should grant and allow them all their privileges in as full and ample a manner as they have at any time heretofore been granted and allowed.

With respect to yourself, Mr. Speaker, though His Honour is sensible that you are fully qualified for this office, I am sure that you will ever put the most favourable construction on your words and actions.

His Honour was then pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

**HIS HONOUR'S SPEECH**

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island:

1. It affords me much pleasure to welcome you on this the Opening of the Third Session of the Forty-second General Assembly.

2. I am fully appreciative of the high honour and privilege that it is mine in assuming office as His Majesty's representative in Prince Edward Island.

3. In the passing of His Honour the Honourable Charles Dalton, the Honourable James D. Stewart, K.C., and Mr. Callum J. Bruce, M.L.A., a Lieutenant-Governor, a Premier and Attorney-General, and a Member of the Legislature are mourned throughout the length and breadth of our native Province.

4. We are encouraged by the progress now being made toward recovery from the many difficulties which have been so world wide during the last four years. Conditions in this Province have begun to show improvement and the outlook is brighter than for some time past.

5. The Royal Commission on Banking and Currency in Canada held a public hearing in this Province and my Government submitted a brief for the information of the Commission. In regard to the terms of reference, including the establishment of a Central Bank, interest rates, the burden of public and private debts and the need of short term currency for agriculture.

6. At the recent Dominion-Provincial Conference my Ministers were in attendance and it is gratifying to know that the matter of the employment of the further carrying out of the recommendations of the Dunsen Commission are now receiving the attention of the Federal Government.

7. Special interest will attach to the celebration this summer of the 400th Anniversary of Canada's first voyage to America. The programme is of national importance and includes the visit of a distinguished foreign prince and his shores.

8. The efforts of the Department of Agriculture were directed principally along educational lines, through Boys' and Girls' Clubs, School Course work, School Fairs, Exhibitions and public meetings. Emphasis was at all times placed on the importance of quality in the marketing of our farm products rather than that of quantity. The yearly production of live stock with properly balanced feed crop acreages was advocated as a more profitable system than specialization along any one line with a view to the marketing of a large volume. The upward trend in prices, with at least average yields from all crops, causes greater optimism among our producers.

9. It is the intention of my Government to be prepared to take advantage of any Federal Agricultural Marketing legislation, which may be considered a benefit to our Province.

10. The final payment of the Technical Grant, which was used so largely in this Province for agricultural education purposes, has been received. The loss of this grant to the Department will make it more difficult to carry out its policies.

11. It is gratifying to note that the fox industry continues to be a source of ready money for a large number of our citizens. The increase in returns received for pelts is most encouraging and it is believed the industry has a very promising future.

12. The need of wider markets for our fisheries is fully recognized by my Government, and in cooperation with the Federal Government and the Governments of the Province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, this matter will continue to receive attention.

13. My Government, associated with the Governments of the Province of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, have revived the Maritime Transportation Commission, in order to conserve to our producers and shippers the benefits of the Maritime Freight Rates Act and as a safeguard against unfair competition in transportation charges.

14. During the year past schools were in operation and the daily attendance of pupils was the greatest in the history of the Province. With the encouragement of the Carnegie Corporation by its endowment of a chair in Economics and Sociology in Prince of Wales College, a fourth year was added to the course at that institution thereby enabling its graduates to complete the work of Junior College and to enter directly upon their professional courses or Junior year of the Arts Course. An increase of about one hundred students at the opening of the College in September made necessary the addition of three members to the teaching staff. Owing to the surplus of the necessity for advancement, a higher standard of qualifications will be required of future candidates for teachers.

15. We were pleased to have the McGill University Library School conduct its summer course in Prince of Wales College last July, when thirty-three candidates received certificates of successful completion of the course.

16. In the Provincial Library Demonstration provided for by the Carnegie Corporation, books are being purchased and catalogued as rapidly as possible. Five branch libraries were opened before the end of the year and the ready support and urgent demand for other branches indicate a keen appreciation of the great boon conferred on this Province in the field of adult education.

17. The Department of Health is in sympathy with the publicity campaign now being conducted by the patients of the Provincial Sanatorium. Persons who have been and are afflicted with tuberculosis realize its menace and they may do much in their own communities by the timely word of warning. The increased number of citizens well and active apolites of health in the battle against this dread malady, they can gain credit in eliminating the disease from our midst.

18. The Department is also deeply interested in steps to combat the heavy inroads being made by cancer. In the absence of a recognized cancer fund, persons who have been and are afflicted with tuberculosis realize its menace and they may do much in their own communities by the timely word of warning. The increased number of citizens well and active apolites of health in the battle against this dread malady, they can gain credit in eliminating the disease from our midst.

19. My Government has leased from the Trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital the former hospital building, with option to purchase. This building is now being used to house the infirm patients, formerly quartered in the Newson Block. The new home, which is spacious and comfortable, provides excellent accommodation, with none of the inconveniences which necessarily had to be contended with in the temporary quarters.

20. The east wing of the mental hospital at Falconwood was reconstructed and is now ready for occupation. The new building, together with the infirmary at Falconwood Hospital will provide greatly improved facilities as compared with the existing emergency arrangements.

21. It is pleasing to announce that the Department of Public Works and Highways have maintained the fine condition of the Province in splendid condition and in a manner consistent with the policy of strict economy. This policy will be continued and no large expenditures will be made. The program of work is confined to the maintenance of roads, bridges and equipment, capital expenditure being made only where necessary to the improvement of the Province.

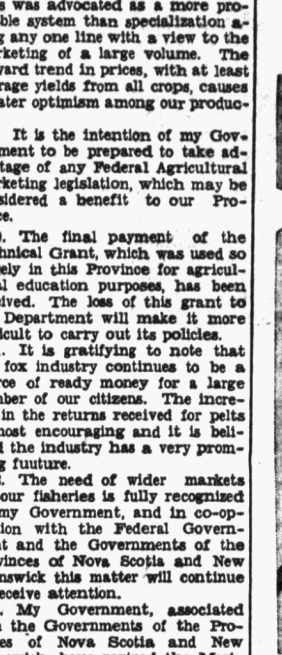
22. Representatives of my Government were successful in obtaining a Federal grant for the relief of unemployment in the Province. By means of this grant under "The Relief Act, 1933" a program of works was undertaken and is at present in operation in various employments in the different sections of the Province where relief is urgent.
