**Jones Has Close Shave**

**BRAE BURN COUNTRY CLUB.** Newton, Mass., Sept. 13.—The downfall of five former American titleholders and a close call for the king himself, Bobby Jones, today furnished a succession of upsets and thrills in the opening rounds of match play of the Amateur Golf championship. With his crown hanging in the balance, Jones staged a desperate uphill fight in his second match to outlast R. Gay Gordon, home club veteran, and win by the margin of one up at the 19th hole, after he had easily disposed of the New Jersey champion, J. Wolcott Brown, by a score of 4 to 3 in the morning round.

This victory for Jones, the first extra hole match he has ever played in the title tournament, brought a spectacular climax a day that saw his most dangerous rival, George Von Elm, of Detroit, the only man who has beaten Bobby in the last four years of championship play, eliminated in the first match of the day by Arthur W. Yates of Rochester, N. Y., by 3 to 2.

**Forfeit Right to Continue**

SAINT JOHN, Sept. 13.—The New Brunswick Amateur Baseball Association cut the Gordian knot of the baseball tangle that has prevailed ever since the provincial play-offs started, by eliminating the Saint John Water Department, favored to win the title, as a result of their failure to meet Chatham in a game won by the Watermen was doubleheader at the North Shore town yesterday. **Heard Appeal**
