ISLAND AVIATOR'S NARROW ESCAPE.—A letter has been received in this city, telling of the thrilling experience of Lieut. Colin C. McDonald, son of Mr. G. A. P. McDonald, of Penitence, Cal., formerly of this city, in an aerial bombing raid. Lieut. McDonald was the only aviator wounded among the British. They arose above the Huns and succeeded in dropping their bombs upon them. The result was that the Huns came down like bolts from the sky. Four German machines were sent down in flames, two were smashed to pieces and one was put out of control. A bullet went through Lieut. McDonald's machine passing through his field boot and lodging in his leg. The main thought in mind at this juncture was to get the machine back safely to the Allies lines. Lieut. McDonald's observer with words of encouragement said, "never mind, Mack, I'll take her back and land her." The young lieutenant though suffering intense pain managed to keep his senses and in good time, though the machine was badly riddled, the rudder almost gone and wires shot away, they succeeded in making a fairly good landing in an aerodrome in Belgium. Lieut. McDonald was at once conveyed to a hospital where he received the best of treatment and the last heard of him he was in the Royal Flying Corps Hospital in London making good progress towards recovery.

 (6) Science—its place in industrial development.  
 3. The Promotion of Reading Groups—this to be made a means of promoting a knowledge of healthy literature and stimulating reading along right lines.  
 4. The Development of a definite Library System.  
 The second main division of the work relates to the Period of Demobilization. From the point of view of the soldier this will be the most critical period of the whole history of our army. Dr. Tory, therefore, recommends that plans be put on foot to plant an educational system in one of our camps—University in Khaki—where practically all branches of study that could possibly be offered would be offered and with an extension department going out to every camp in England or France. The courses offered would include: Studies leading to Matriculation, Agriculture, Business Training, Academic College Work, Engineering, Normal Training, Medical Instruction, Legal Studies, Religious Work, Physical Education, etc.  
 Upon returning to Canada the latter part of September, Dr. Tory laid his plans before the National Council. These were unanimously endorsed and the hope expressed that Dr. Tory would be able to assume permanent direction of this important work. Since that time conferences have been held with Presidents of Universities and Colleges and other educational leaders throughout the Dominion, resulting in the organization of an Advisory Council of which President Falconer of the University of Toronto is chairman. Assurance has been given that credit will be given in recognized educational institutions throughout the country for courses satisfactorily completed overseas. Early in January, Dr. Tory, having accepted the invitation of the National Council to become Director of this educational work, sailed for overseas, having secured from the Government prior to his departure, very strong approval of the general character of the work proposed.  
 Since Dr. Tory's visit overseas rapid progress has been made in the development of the Educational Work, both in England and France, along all the lines indicated under the heading of Dr. Tory's report, including Educational Lectures, Small Study and Reading Groups, and the development of a systematic Library Scheme. In Camp Witley alone, within one month after Dr. Tory's visit, 700 different soldiers were engaged in study under the instruction of volunteer leaders.  
 A small committee, was appointed by Major-General Turner, with representatives from the Military Department and Chaplains' Service and with Lieut.-Col. Birks as Y.M.C.A. representative, to visit and report upon Educational Work in the camps in England and France. The work

of this Committee has no doubt given impetus to the work which Dr. Tory inaugurated and the indications are that we must prepare for very large development in this branch of our service immediately and especially following the declaration of peace.  
 In closing his report, Dr. Tory says: "I am firmly convinced that no greater service could be rendered Canada looking towards the reconstruction days, than that the educational program proposed should be carried out in a general spirit. In the first place a feeling of gratification would be created among the men in the army by the knowledge that the people at home were thinking and planning for their future in a practical way. This feeling, I am sure, would be reflected very strongly in the relations of the returned men to the public at home during the re-settlement period, a period which will certainly be very trying for Canada. In the second place it would help to settle in a definite groove a considerable number of men who today are in doubt as to their future by giving them a start along the line of their future life before they return home. In the third place, as the army contains a great body of the choicest men of Canada, brought together from all parts of the country, no greater opportunity could ever occur for the educational forces at home in the army to make themselves felt in the development of the national spirit and the promotion of the national and imperial ideals created by the war."  
 "In a word, the University in Khaki might be made the starting-point of a great movement not only in agriculture and industry, but in the spiritual, educational and political life of Canada."  
 It is interesting to note that a Study Course for the training of Y.M.C.A. Secretaries has been organized as a part of this large educational scheme.

War Garden Bulletin  
 PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN  
 Notes on Garden Pests issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with the Dominion Entomologist

MARY, GET YOUR HOE  
 Any seeds sown in June should go deeper than those planted earlier in the year and care should be taken to press the soil into firm contact with the seeds when covering them because the soil is apt to be dry to a depth of several inches, in sections where the rainfall has been low. Where watering is resorted to, the moisture should go under the seeds in the row before sowing. It does no good to sprinkle the top of the ground after sowing.  
 June is a hard taskmaster as a rule for the amateur gardener. Weeds grow apace; bugs flourish; the ground is thirsty. Watering can, spray pump and hoe must be kept working overtime.  
 The woman in the home can spare half an hour or so a day from her household duties to cope with the weeds. "Mary, get your hoe" is one of the patriotic refrains of the year to which she might give some heed.

IN MEMORIAM  
 JOSEPH LAWRENCE MCLELLAN  
 At Grand River, Lot 14, on Tuesday the 18th inst Joseph Lawrence McClellan son of Angus McClellan, passed away. The deceased was a young man of upright character, beloved by his many friends and his demise at the early age of 27 is a sore blow to them all but especially to his aged parents. He enlisted in the 105th Battalion and after training in Summerside went to Valcartier and there developed tuberculosis. He spent some time in the sanatorium and was discharged from the army. He greatly regretted that he was unable to go to the front and even die a soldier's death. He was the third member of the family to enlist. John, who enlisted from the Canadian West, was killed at the Somme and James, the youngest, who enlisted from the Red Cross drug store, Summerside, was killed at Passchendaele. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to Mr. and Mrs. McClellan in their bereavement. There remain only two children, Marshal at home and Mrs. J. Buote in Providence, R. I. The other three they have given to their country. Joseph McClellan bore his long illness with christian fortitude and he was consoled by the frequent visits of his pastor, Father John A. Macdonald and Father Connolly. He died fortified with all the rites of the Catholic Church. His funeral at St. Patrick's church on Tuesday was largely attended. The services were conducted by the pastor, the Rev. John A. Macdonald, assisted by a full choir. While his brothers sleep on the blood stained fields of France his remains were quietly laid to rest in the cemetery of his native parish at Grand River, there to await a glorious resurrection. The pall bearers were Linus McDonald, Raymond Praught, Linus McNeill and Killian McDonald.
