**PRISON CAMPS AND CONCENTRATION CAMPS.**

The pro-Boer press throughout the world has raised considerable outcry against the concentration camps in South Africa, in which nearly 100,000 of the Boer population are housed and fed. It is claimed that the deathrate, especially among the children, has been higher than ought to be. This has been explained by the British authorities as largely due to the fact that the Boer women would not permit their children to be treated in the hospitals attached to each camp, but attended to their cases themselves. And even then the mortality was not greater than frequently occurs in fairly well-appointed cities during the sickly season.

But what shall be said on the other side of the humanity of the British military authorities in sheltering, feeding and clothing almost the entire helpless and dependent population of the Boer republics, the aged, the weak, the sick, women and children, while the Boer husbands and fathers, freed from family incumbrances, are fighting in the field against the Government which feeds and clothes their wives and children? On its very face the concentration camp gives evidence of humanity pushed to an extreme never before known under similar circumstances.

And how is it with the prison camps, in Bermuda, St. Helena, India and Ceylon where the prisoners taken in battle are confined? In all cases the prisoners themselves admit that they are well treated. Ten thousand of them are bestowed in six camps in Ceylon, Bombay, Madras and Southern India. There every Boer is provided by the Government with clothing, a camp mattress with bed clothes and is allowed to draw the same food rations as the British soldiers who are his keepers. There are allowed many comforts in addition, and fare quite as well as the British officers who are in the field.

The Civita Cattolica, published in Rome, prints an article from its Indian correspondent who has personally visited these prison camps. He tells that these camps are well laid out, generally with long rows of huts, like those of the natives, arranged in wide streets, that are lighted at night by electric lamps. In each cabin from ten to twelve prisoners are quartered under the direct control of one of their number, who is elected as captain. Around the entire settlement there are barriers of barbed wire, and outside this are the camps of the English soldiers who keep guard. Most of the officers are on parole, and are allowed to go wherever they like within reasonable limits of the camp. The other Boers are given regular exercise and there are often friendly contests at football and cricket between the prisoners and the British troops. About the only thing which the Boers are not allowed to have is money. If it is sent by friends it is taken in charge by a British official, who gives a receipt for it, and who will restore it when the men are set at liberty.

The manner in which the Boer prisoners of war are treated has not only been and is humane but generous, even by the admission of the prisoners themselves. And it is too much to believe that the war prisoners are thus kindly cared for while the women and children in the concentration camps suffer from cruelty and neglect. The fact is that the attacks upon the concentration camps are largely made up of political spleen directed against the Government of the day and willing to score a political point without regard to truth. The Boston Herald is fair enough to say, "It would seem as though everything possible was being done for the comfort of the Boers, who are probably living better in these camps than they ever did in their own homes in South Africa."

The Nova Scotia Secretary for Agriculture reports that farm crops throughout the Province were this year somewhat below the average in quantity, but the aggregate value is above the average owing to improved prices.

Of those who came by ocean ports, 9,331 were English, 833 Irish, 1,476 Scotch, 530 Germans, 838 Scandinavian, 492 French and Belgian and 17,572 from other European countries.

We feel assured that all the other speakers at the unveiling of the Louisburg gun will agree with us that the address of Rev. Father Gauthier on that occasion was a masterpiece of eloquence as admirable in its spirit as it was pleasing and graceful in diction. From those who heard its delivery and those who read the printed report of this oration we hear only expressions of the warmest admiration.

There is a prevalent impression that the steady increase in drunkenness in Charlottetown of late is in some way connected with the coming by election in West Queens. A statement to that effect has been wired abroad and is obtaining circulation in the mainland newspapers. Surely the members of the Government of the day are not willing to remain under such an imputation. The remedy is to enforce the law. It is a painful fact that illegal sale of liquors is increasing. It would be more painful still to believe that this arises from the consent or connivance of those in authority.

Santos Dumont of fair fame is a millionaire and had no need of the prize of 100,000 francs recently awarded him. Moreover he did not win it strictly within the conditions laid down. The conditions were that he should start in his airship from Aero Club Park, which is on a hill outside Paris, sail to and around the Eiffel Tower eight miles distant and return and land at the Park within a time limit of thirty minutes. He could have completed the trip within the time but made a series of circles and flourishes in the air before alighting, which occupied thirty or forty seconds beyond the specified time. M. Deutch, who gave the prize, is himself a wealthy aeronaut and is now building a new airship. The Deutch prize was at first refused to Dumont but he protested against being deprived of it on a technicality and his protest was successful. Then he gave away the money, partly to the poor and partly to his assistants.
