

Eight Lives Are Lost When Ship Goes To Bottom

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 29.—Latest developments in the loss of the steamer City of New York, which foundered ten miles off Stoney Point, while on her way from Oswego to Trenton with a cargo of coal, show that eight lives were lost. Five bodies were found in the yawl, picked up late Friday afternoon by the steamer Isabelle, and Captain Harry Randall, his ten months' old child, and Stanley Pape, aged twelve, of Seely's Bay are still missing. Four of the five bodies found in the yawl have been identified by Captain John Randall, father of the master of the ill-fated schooner.

TWO CANSO MEN ARE DROWNED

CANSO, Dec. 1.—Distressing news has just been received here that a Dover fishing vessel has returned from the fishing grounds today with the loss of two men. These are John Barry and William Horn, members of the crew of Samuel Mason's boat. Dover is five miles from Canso, and with all of the Canso fleet the boats belonging to that village were on the grounds today.

About noon thick snow shut down with strong east winds, shortly after the boats began to arrive through the storm. It was phoned that all had reached their harbors until the word came of Mason's men being missing.

Captain Mason reports that he searched for his men from one o'clock till dark shut down. His position while fishing today was south of White Point.

is after. Then he wants to buy his Chicago pork, FREE OF DUTY, at five or six cents a pound. DO YOU WANT THE PRICE OF YOUR PORK CUT DOWN TO THAT FIGURE? And this is another thing that he is after. Then again he wants to get his implements in free of duty. He doesn't sell his wheat in Ontario, for they have enough of their own, and it makes no difference to him if all the industries in the East are closed down, IF HE CAN DO ALL HIS BUYING AND SELLING IN THE WESTERN STATES. But you have a different line of products for sale, and now with the Fordney Tariff against you in the United States, these big industrial centres are the most valuable, and practically the only markets for your produce. Can you, for the sake of a trifling 7 per cent duty on implements, which you do not always have to pay, afford to close down those industries?

Then the Grain Grower wants the revenue raised BY DIRECT TAXATION. Do you want that? Who is to pay those direct taxes? Certainly not the Grain Growers. They will take good care of that. You have had your experience with direct taxes in connection with the Bell Government. Are you anxious to have another tribe of valuers and assessors, and these followed by a horde of tax collectors, with big tax bills, getting after you after the Bell Government fashion? Then again the Western Provinces want to get possession of the public lands in their domain, PAID FOR WITH YOUR MONEY, without allowing you a dollar of compensation. DO YOU WANT THAT ALSO? Yet this is another of the things the West are after, AND MR. CRERAR WAS MOST OUTSPOKEN IN DECLARING THAT "THE EAST HAVE NO EQUITY IN THOSE LANDS." Campaign Notes

(The Examiner)

One clear line of cleavage exists between the opposition candidates and the candidates supporting the Meighen Government. It is as plain as patent as the international border line or as the sun in the sky.

One of Canada's chief industries is the production of foodstuffs on our farms. The home market afforded by our cities and towns consumes about 85 per cent. of this production. This invaluable home market is protected by moderate customs duties which the Government would retain. The Liberal and Farmer parties WOULD ABANDON AND REPEAL THESE DUTIES and the revenue they produce and THROW OUR MARKET WIDE OPEN TO OUR NEIGHBORS, who are slanting us out of their market by almost prohibitive duties. Beyond cavil or dispute this is where the division line between the government and the opposition is located.

What will follow if the opposition policy is adopted? American farmers will POUR INTO THE CANADIAN MARKET their meats, fish, poultry, eggs and butter, and every DOLLAR'S WORTH that comes in WILL DISPLACE THE same value of what the Canadian farmer produces. This comes home to our island farmers who are LARGE PRODUCERS OF PORK, beef, mutton, lamb, poultry and eggs. Our farmers are feeling the American competition keenly now, here in Charlottetown. Already one of our meat packing firms has closed, and others are greatly limiting their purchases. They have TENS OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS worth of LAST YEAR'S PORK and MUTTON in cold storage, unsold because of the American invasion of our market. This is true while our market is in some measure protected. What will be THE MEASURE of the DISASTER to our farmers if the policy of free foodstuffs is adopted?

Already, as our farmers have been warned, ALMOST TWENTY TIMES as much value of American pork and eggs was sold in Canada last year as was sold of Canadian pork and eggs in the United States. Make American foodstuffs free of duty and will the overflow from across the border not be GREATLY INCREASED. Undoubtedly it would be crowding out and displacing more and more of the products of our own farms from our own markets. And under the opposition policy the DUTY WOULD BE LOST and the loss must be made good by DIRECT TAXATION! Are our intelligent farmers disposed to face such unfair competition at such FEARFUL ODDS, and in face of such grave consequences to themselves and to the country? We cannot believe it. We have too much confidence in their intelligence and patriotism to believe it!

As it is now, under the policy of moderate protection, we are buying about twice as much from our neighbors across the line as they buy from us. And THE ENORMOUS BALANCE OF TRADE against Canada is the one main cause of the depreciation of our good Canadian dollar, which is worth but 85 to 90 cents in the States. "Free foodstuffs and free agricultural implements, with a general all-round reduction of the Canadian tariff," which is the declared policy of both the Liberal and Progressive parties WOULD INCREASE OUR PURCHASES IN THE STATES, increase greatly THE ADVERSE BALANCE OF TRADE, and must further DEPRECIATE THE CANADIAN DOLLAR, possibly in a few years to 75 cents. Against such disasters and calamities and to PROTECT THE
