AN ASSASSINATION MOST COLD BLOODED

SYDNEY, Sept. 13.—Michael Nash is lying in the County goal tonight with a charge of murder hanging over his head. His crime, it is asserted, is the most cold-blooded assassination plot in the history of Canada. Max Passerino, the Italian Paderone, at Dominion No. 1, was stabbed by Nash on Friday, and died while lying on a stretcher for medical attendance. The affray took place in a shack to which Nash had invited Passerino, and while the latter claims that he got into a row with the Padone and only used his stiletto in self-defence, the Crown authorities assert that they can bring evidence to prove that there was a deliberate conspiracy to lure the man to this shack, and it is also asserted that the affair was planned with a view of intimidating the foreigners still working for the Dominion Coal Company.

SASKATOON BLOCK REDUCED TO ASHES

SASKATOON, Sask., Sept. 13.—The most serious fire in the history of Saskatoon took place recently. The fire broke out in the rear of the Bowman block and when the firemen arrived the building was in a mass of flames. Only hard work on the part of the department saved the whole business block from ruin. The damage is estimated at \$40,000 and with the \$15,000 insurance. The losers are the Saskatoon Drug and Stationery Co., \$12,000, heavily insured; P. F. Woolhouse, jeweler, loss unknown; G. A. Woolhouse, stationery, loss \$7,000, insurance \$2,000; Mightons, Bell and Turner, real estate, \$100; Dominion Express Co., loss small. The Bowman building is a complete loss with little insurance. A high wind was blowing but the fire was kept from spreading.

CHICAGO'S THREE POLITICAL ACES



CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 12.—All Chicago, like all Gaul, years ago, divided into three parts. Three men got together at night, and over their cigars admiringly divided up this great city with its two and a half million people, as their own personal political property. They assumed the rulership of this great empire, as big as 10 western states, and for convenience divided it up. Of these three men, one was elected by the people of Chicago as its chief executive. EXCITEMENT ON GASPE COAST

DALHOUSIE, N. B., Sept. 13.—Prompt action by the Quebec and Dominion authorities prevented serious trouble at Fox River and other points in Gaspé county where several hundred fishermen undertook last week for force to have the Jersey merchants sign contracts to pay four dollars a quintal for the season's catch of codfish and to wipe their debts off the books. The merchants complained that they could not return to their places of business unless the ringleaders of the riot were arrested and punished. The cruiser Canada was ordered to leave Quebec for Fox River with a military crew of sixty men. The Canada arrived on Thursday morning. Twenty men were arrested and jailed at Percé. There is great excitement on the Gaspé coast over the affair.

BOATSWAIN CONFIRMS. ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Sept. 14.—Alvan Whitten, who was boatswain of the Peary steamer Erik in 1908, confirms Dr. Cook's charge in Copenhagen that Peary's men took Cook's provisions, adding, "not only did the crew of the ship take Cook's supplies at Etah, but boats were sent to remove Cook's provisions stored there."

MAY TAKE UP QUESTION OF CHEAPER CABLES

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux will leave on the 20th inst. for Bern, Switzerland, to attend the international postal convention. He will be absent from the capital for about a month. It is probable that the postmaster general will also confer with the imperial authorities with reference to the question of cheaper cable communication between Canada and the mother country. A TERRIBLE EXPLOSION. VICTORIA MINES, Sept. 14.—An explosion occurred in the smelter here. Two men have died and one other has been badly burned. A water jacket surrounding the settler broke and the contact of the water and white heat of the settler caused the accident. Three attendants were sitting close by eating their midnight meal, and without a moment's warning were deluged with molten metal. The flesh of all three was practically roasted off them.
