WARNING TO UNDERTAKERS.

Mustn't Use the Same Draperies at two Funerals.

MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—The Provincial Board of Health met yesterday. The following bylaw was adopted with reference to the practice in vogue among undertakers of using the same drapery in different mortuary chambers.

"It is forbidden to funerals undertakers or other persons to introduce draperies or other ornaments or decorations in a house infected with smallpox, Asiatic cholera, typhus, diphtheria, croup, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, tuberculosis (consumption) measles, whooping cough, puerperal fever, erysipelas or other contagious disease. Any infraction of this bylaw is liable to a penalty of twenty dollars."

EVANGELIST IRA SANKEY

Returns from Europe and Gives His opinion of the State of Religion in England.

Ira. B. Sankey, the evangelist and hymn singer with his wife was a passenger by the Kaiser Wilhelmder Grosse, which arrived recently from Bremen, Southampton, and Cherbourg. He said he had been four months traveling, lecturing, and singing in England, Ireland, and Scotland. One of his objects in returning here is to his four grand-children Frances Hope Sankey who was born in Brooklyn recently. He said that religion had changed in England since he last visited that country. He had observed that there was less theology and more belief in and admiration of Christ among the people than there ever had been. While Mr. Sankey is here he will spend most of his time in completing his autobiography and writing a history of hymns that he has sung.

"STOP THIEF!"

It is an old trick among the light-fingered fraternity to divert attention from themselves by raising the cry of "stop thief" and so putting the public on a false scent.

Mules for the Army.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 23.—Capt. Heygate of the British army is purchasing 50,000 cavalry horses and mules for the British army in South Africa. He came here more than a year ago to buy horses and mules, but was ordered home a short time ago. But the unexpected renewal of hostilities has made the purchase of more horses and mules necessary. As fast as the animals are inspected and bought they will be sent to New Orleans and shipped to Cape Town, Durban and New London, on British transports, some of which are now on their way to the United States. One shipment of the animals will be taken to South Africa by Lieut. David Moberly, leaving New Orleans soon after January.
