SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON III. APRIL 21.
THE APPOINTMENT OF THE TWELVE.

Mark 3: 7-13; Matt. 5: 13-16.

GOLDEN TEXT.

"Ye did not choose me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that ye should go and bear fruit."—John 15: 16.

POINTED SUGGESTIONS.

A more interesting and instructive lesson could scarcely be indicated than this one. There is the study of the crowd and its reasons for thronging Jesus; a study of the purpose of Jesus in the choice and appointment of twelve; a study of their several histories and personal characters; a study of the duties imposed upon them by their apostolic appointment—surely a full programme for brain work and hearty interest and the capacity to become a part of all that one learns.
Recent events in Jerusalem, with the controversy they developed, have brought two things, at least, into focus. First, the popular regard for Jesus as a wonder-worker. Secondly, the fixed determination of the rulers to pursue Jesus to the death.
And the regard of the crowd for Jesus, even the urgent push and clamor of those afflicted with plagues, had no basis in a true conception of His mission to men, while the pious prejudices of those who sought to take His life were baseless and unwarranted. They were, however, as malignant as prejudice, as cruel as bigotry, as relentless as hate.
The preaching office, founded upon the discipleship and testimony of living and loving witnesses, must be established. Men may be put to death, even Jesus Christ will submit to the ignominy, but the truth must live. And men must come to know the truth. Hence the Apostolate.
But why the choice of the men of whom the lesson gives the record? They were to be useful men, providing for the world a necessary service of salvation. They were to be self-forgetful, seeking the glory of God and not of others? Why from the ranks of fishermen and not from the ranks of scholars? Where would the answer to that question lead you if you could find it? Possibly into the establishment of a religion of class and caste.
Better take it for granted that our Lord, who knew what was in man, chose for His apostles the very best material at hand for the purpose. Remember that His purpose was not local but world-wide; not temporary but age-long. Remember that the gospel of Jesus was a new gospel proceeding from a new covenant which, at the same time, fulfilled and cast aside the old covenant. The apostles of such a faith should step to their service unfettered and free. They should be men who are natural, teachable, open-hearted, loyal, strong and brave.
A story of who the chosen twelve were and their sobriquets and of the divergent qualities of their characters and of the mixture they make by reason of their trade and patriotic predilections, as, for example, zealot and tax-gatherer; such a study is fascinating. But when one leaps to the need of their story! Ah, there are Pentecosts in that, and heart and voice are full with the praise which is due to "the glorious company of the apostles."
What a mission is given to them! "Ye are the salt of the earth." "Ye are the light of the world." They were to be busy men, out in the open

and the good of their fellowmen.
Jesus taught them that by word and example and He began His specific teaching for their apostolic office and destiny with the Beatitudes. It was a good beginning. There is none better to-day for the followers of Jesus. The principles of the doctrine of Christ are rooted there. Fidelity to Jesus, unto the death, is assured where the teaching of the Beatitudes has brought their beneficent mastery upon the soul. They are the life of Jesus transmuted into doctrine. Their mastery, therefore, is the mastery of Jesus. It is His word abiding in us.
When borne down by the thought of their utter insufficiency and weighed with the sad and awful problems of life which others have to face, they shall be comforted. "Blessed are they that weep now, for they shall laugh."
Meekness—the Christian's mental and spiritual balancing pole, keeping the mind and heart in settled poise, free from impatience or fret-meekness, abiding the Lord's time, come into the possession of that which is the Lord's. The meek inherit the earth.
Hunger is a good sign of health. To be hungry for God—to be like Him—to long for Christlikeness and Christian excellence is a sign of moral and spiritual health. The promise is filling to the point of attention.
Mercy—the twin grace with love, full of faith, bright with hope, strong in its might of endurance—never fails. Blessed are the merciful for they shall obtain, one day, what they shall feel they need above all else. Purity of heart compasses all virtues and finds the gate wide open to the greatest of all rewards.

LESSON IV. APRIL 28. THE BEATITUDES. Matt. 5: 1-12. GOLDEN TEXT "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."—Matt. 5: 8. HOME READING. POINTED SUGGESTIONS

Take notice of the fact that the most formal and definite and complete proclamation of the ethical teaching and applied doctrine of the life of Jesus Christ amongst men that He ever made was uttered in the presence of the mixed multitude and intended for the ears and understandings of all.
The Sermon on the Mount was not greatly properly or can it be restricted in its meaning by any hierarchical interpretation. While Jesus did not proceed to teach in the presence of the mixed multitude before He knew that His chosen disciples were in position and in condition to hear, the prescriptive rights of Protestantism were granted and exemplified that day, viz: "Individual hearing, individual interpretation and individual responsibility."
It will assist one in his study of the Sermon on the Mount to keep in mind the three great representative classes whom Jesus addresses. They may pass under other names from time to time, but as Jesus beheld them they might be named the irreligious, the Judaic and the Gentile. He meets and defeats in turn the cavils of the irreligious, the man fettered by legalism and the man bound by the worldliness of long-cherished idolatry.
If the sermon on the Mount were to be spoken of as a story one would say that Jesus was its original character. The creed which is taken for granted throughout is: "I believe in Jesus Christ—Messiah."
The story is the Master's way of living, written out. There is no virgin, outlined in it, nor is there any manner of life indicated in it which His life does not fulfil.
It is for this reason that the Sermon on the Mount is regarded as pre-eminently the moral and spiritual code of the New Testament to which the Christian makes final appeal in matters pertaining to character. It is as truly the cornerstone of Christian morality as Magna Charta may be said to be the keystone of English liberty.
What a word it is with the peerless sermon opens: "Blessed! Heaven is in its breath. It is all radiant with the smile of God. It lifts us out of the low zone of consideration for the temporal or fleshly, up to the exalted level of the eternal and spiritual. The highest expression of the purest happiness—"Blessed!"
And first, the kingdom of heaven, the kingdom of eternal happiness, is handed over to "the poor in spirit" who stand self-stripped and self-emptied before the Lord ready for His guidance as the pupil before his instructor, self-abandoned and surrendered to God.
And those that mourn shall be cheered and called to, as encouraging coaches or seconds give helpful stimulus to their men in the race.

AHOY! ABOARD THE MOTOR BOATS

At last the long-looked-for time has arrived when the motor bugs are able to gather by the river, where their "chug-chugs" have been torpid all winter, and begin to make them ready for the season's work.
What a delightful time everybody seems to have in the vicinity of a boat that is being prepared for the summer cruising. There is no lack of volunteers to lend a hand. No consideration as to the effect on their good clothes deters them from offering their services in applying paint, scraping plank, greasing, or rubbing, or doing any of the various dirty jobs that are necessary. At such times there are always several old-timers about, and these are generous with advice. True the older generation is at a loss in the case of the motor boats, but if they have nothing to say there are plenty of experts of more or less mature years who know all about engines and can talk about the same till the tireless hearer wishes they could be sent down to Bruce Stewart's to have silencers put on them.
This sort of thing is going on in our harbor just now, and along the various wharves where the boats (and the boatmen) are lying, active work is in progress. Next week will see some of them in the water, while all will be aloft next month and motor-boat men will be able to get together and talk over things—such as forming a club, arranging for a race, and other matters that are deserving of consideration.

The canoe men are going to make quite a show here this summer. Their ranks have been strengthened by several new arrivals and it is likely that the harbor and rivers will present a livelier spectacle this summer than for many years past.
