



ther any provision could be made for him in his old age.  
THE PREMIER said there is no They could not save anything for their old age and ought not to be left unprovided for. He endorsed the remarks of Mr. Arsenault.  
THE PREMIER agreed with the principle laid down by the previous speakers and hoped the time would come when something could be done to meet these cases.  
Then the question of travelling expenses, not earned as such, Mr. Mathieson contending that such money had been unlawfully paid and misappropriated. He claimed to have a long list of schools in which the attendance was less than 50 per cent of the children of school age. He went on to criticise the statistics of the schools report, charging that they are inaccurate and misleading. With increasing expense there less efficiency from year to year, and no remedy is proposed.  
The discussion was continued by Mr. Arsenault, Mr. Crosby, Mr. Dobie, the Premier, Mr. McLean, Mr. Mathieson, Hon. L. McDonald, Mr. McKinnon, Mr. Dobie, Mr. Prowse and others. In the course of his re-

marks the Premier hoped at a future day the Government might be able to give a small retiring allowance to teachers who have taught for forty years. He was not aware of any such who are now in actual need, and for that reason and because of other demands on the treasury no action could be taken this year. The discussion covered a wide range in which the Government was blamed by the Opposition for not having in twenty years of power devised any measures for improving the school system, or to pay the teachers adequate salaries. In reply to Mr. Mathieson the Premier stated that the entire cost of the Education Commission except an unadjusted account of one of the Commissioners who had been paid \$1000 and wanted \$500 more. At 5.45 the item for Education, \$127,980, was passed and that for Exhibitions, \$6,850 was taken up.  
MR. KENNEDY, Kensington thought there should be a financial statement of the last exhibition, none having appeared in the report on Agriculture.  
THE PREMIER stated that the Legislature had no control over the money given by the Dominion or the

City of Charlottetown. An account of the receipts and expenditures of the Exhibition Association had been published.  
MR. DEWAR supported the demand for a fuller financial statement.  
HON. MR. RICHARDS, in reply to Mr. Arsenault said it was proposed to divide the grant between the counties such as was done last year. In reply to Mr. McLean he explained that the larger grant of \$1500 to Prince County as against \$1,000 for Kings was because the show in Prince was on a larger scale than in Kings.  
EVENING SESSION.  
The House resumed its sitting at 8.30 o'clock and immediately resolved itself into Committee of Supply.  
HON. MR. RICHARDS explained that the reason the report of the last exhibition was not in its usual place in his report was that the greater part of the report was in type before this statement was available.  
MR. MATHIESON claimed that King's County should this year receive a special grant for a seed fair in addition to \$1,000 for the exhibition. The seed fair of last year was very successful, but the accommodation was not sufficient. He did not object at all to what Prince County had received.  
HON. MR. RICHARDS said no ad-

ditional grant had yet been asked for. If it were asked for no doubt the request would be considered.  
HON. MR. MCINNIS said that with a seed fair and a poultry show, he would take care to look out for the rights of King's County.  
MR. DEBLANEY wanted a larger grant for the Egmont Bay fair so that the prize list could be extended. He did not think highly of the side shows at the exhibitions. This feature was further jocularly discussed by Mr. McNeill, Mr. McInnis and others.  
MR. DOBIE said many were of the opinion that it would be better to have the horse races on other days than those of the exhibition. He was not opposed to racing but thought it detracted attention from the principal object of exhibitions.  
DR. WARBURTON favored the creation of a special breed of cart horses to be known as the Island breed. He showed how this could be done and that it would be in the interest of the Province and of stock-breeding generally. It would take some years, but could be done by united effort.  
MR. MATHIESON thought this a good idea but that it would need a good stock farm to bring it about.  
HON. MR. RICHARDS agreed that a special Island type would be of value, but there were great difficulties in the way of bringing it about. He explained that something in this line had been done in the Province of Quebec where special selection of mares of one type had been made and the offspring were registered. The item then passed.  
On the item of Elections, \$250, Mr.

ROME, April 20—Pope Pius is somewhat indisposed and has been cautioned by his physicians, Dr. Petacci, to avoid over exertion.  
His Holiness however has refused to change from his daily routine and today celebrated mass and gave private audiences.

Dewar brought up the Cardigan election and affirmed that he had not put out a dollar bill or a glass of whiskey. No such bills had ever been presented to him. He had paid all the legitimate expenses. The item passed.  
Hospital for the Insane \$41,500 came next. This includes \$34,000 for maintenance, \$6,000 for repairs and \$1,500 for the Superintendent's salary. The Premier said that as far as could be the repairs were done by tender. The Commissioner of Public Works explained that the lowest tender received for shingles was \$7.75 and being too high they were obtained otherwise for \$7.25.  
MR. MATHIESON praised the good work of Dr. Goodwill but directed attention to the increase in cost which had run up from \$17,000 to \$41,000 in a comparatively few years.  
THE PREMIER claimed that the controllable expenditure was kept as low as possible. Repairs on a large building cost and must cost largely. The attendants had to be increased in number, had to be paid more than formerly, and even now threatened occasionally to go on strike in a body. The cost of living had increased at least 33 per cent in 20 years. The expenditure per head was \$2.80 per week per head as compared with various other places which ranged from \$3 to \$4.50 per head in Canada, up to over \$5 per week per head in the United States. He thought patients here got better treatment than in any other asylum in Canada.  
The estimate was further discussed by Mr. Mathieson, who claimed that the average cost per week is \$2.99 per head. Among the "leaks" was the \$50 for the one visit made to the Asylum by the Commissioner of Public Works, as shown by a return before the House.  
Mr. Cox, Dr. Warburton and others further discussed the matter.  
MR. KENNEDY, Kensington, believed that there could be 25 per cent saved on 50 per cent of the goods applied to the Asylum, much of which is supplied without tender. He peculiarly criticised the coal account.  
MR. COX claimed that the lowest cost of maintenance per head went to disprove Mr. Kennedy's contention.  
A scene occurred over an account for coal supplied by Joseph Read, in which it appeared that he had received \$97 more than he had drawn upon the department for.  
THE PREMIER claimed that the payment included \$97 for coal supplied for the court house as appeared from a memorandum on the back of the cheque.  
MR. KENNEDY claimed that no such memorandum was on the cheque when he had it before him during the day.  
THE PREMIER—That statement is not true!  
MR. MATHIESON called upon the chairman to take down the words.  
Some confusion followed, three or four members rising to speak at once. Mr. Kennedy insisted that there

were figures now on the back of the cheque which were not on it in the morning. Then there were disputes as to what the Premier had said and what other members had said. The Premier claimed that the figures on the back of the cheque had been placed there by the bank clerk. A long altercation followed in which some members sought to bring about a conciliation but in vain.  
HON. MR. CUMMISKEY at 11.25 moved the adjournment of the debate, till 10 o'clock tomorrow.  
This was consented to by the Opposition, the feeling on both sides being that no further business could be done. The committee then rose.  
MR. MATHIESON called the Speaker's attention to the fact that certain words had been used by the Premier charging a member with making a statement which was untrue.  
THE PREMIER made a statement on his part and the House adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow.

Pointers on Fertilizing

As one kind of animal differs from another in respect to its requirements and uses of the different elements of nutrition, so one kind of plant differs from another in its demands upon the various fertilizer ingredients in the soil. The benefits of a crop rotation are due to the fact that different crops have different requirements, e. g., a crop of clover will chiefly depend on its available supply of phosphoric acid and potash, but has no difficulty in obtaining its nitrogen, since the clover belongs to an order of plants (Leguminosae) which can assimilate the free nitrogen of the atmosphere with the aid of certain bacteria living in little nodules on their roots.

Clover, then, not only secures the nitrogen necessary for its own growth, but leaves in the soil, in the remains of its deeply-ramifying roots, a valuable stock of organic nitrogen for the next crop.

Now wheat is the crop which greatly depends for its success on a large supply of nitrogen, so the clover crop is obviously a desirable predecessor for wheat.
