The following is a comparison of temperatures and precipitation for the past four years, kindly compiled by Mr. Leith Wright of the Marine Department.

As will be seen, the hottest weather for the past four years was in the month of July last year when the mercury reached 87. The coldest was in the month of January 1923 when the thermometer registered 21 below zero. The coldest last year was 11 below zero, in the month of January.

As regards total snowfall, 1926 leads with 159.4 inches as compared with the next highest, that of 1923 with 100 inches. The month of October of the year 1925 leads in rainfall with 5.82 inches.

Provincial Bank Year Satisfactory

The preliminary figures of the annual statement of the Provincial Bank of Canada have just been given out, and show very satisfactory results, as compared with the preceding years. During the past year, the paid-up capital of the bank has been increased by \$1,000,000. It is now of \$4,000,000 with reserves amounting to \$1,776,000.

The net profits are of \$164,123, as compared with \$407,258 the previous year. The regular dividend of 9 per cent per annum has been applied for authorization in full of the maintenance of new branches, and also employed to reduce the following accounts: 'Bank premises and furniture' and 'Real estate other than bank premises.'

Taxes paid by the bank, whether to the Dominion or Provincial Governments, or to Municipalities are in excess of the sum of \$107,000 or about \$9,000 per month. The liquid assets are of more than \$2,700,000 giving a percentage of nearly 65 per cent on the total obligations to the public deposits, etc., amounting to \$42,040,000.

The new issue of stock, together with the premium on same, in all taken up by shareholders actual clients of the bank, and paid for by them out of their deposit balances. If due account is taken of this fact, and also of the fact that as of November 30, 1926, the bank had about \$690,000 of temporary deposits, the total deposits received from the public are \$3,400,000 in excess of their figures of the previous year. During the same period, 37,731 new deposit accounts have been opened.

The regular annual meeting is called for the 2nd of February next, when the full statement will be submitted.
