Provincial Exhibition Newslets

The Provincial Exhibition grounds are a scene of great activity these days in preparation for the big Fair which opens Monday evening, August 15th, and closes August 19th. Over fifty workmen are employed, some on the great big new grandstand which will accommodate 2,000 people, others building the 37 stalls for show horses, others on plumbing work, and still more on painting and white-washing. Sharp at eight o'clock in the morning they commence their activities and continue with an interval at noon until five o'clock.

Under the deft hands of the workmen great changes are noticeable every day and by the time their work is concluded the Provincial Exhibition grounds will be clean, bright and attractive, ready to welcome the many thousands of Prince Edward Islanders and others who will witness the biggest show of all time, the week of August 15th to 19th.

Provincial Exhibition patrons will this season see an entirely new kind of variety in the afternoon and evening shows in front of the Grand Stand, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, August 15th to 19th, the Gayde Girl Review, consisting of eight captivating and highly trained dancing girls who are also good singers, will appear in the costumes of the Mounties, Scotch Kitties and in other feature roles. Their tap, tilter, adagio and other dance numbers are a new departure and will appeal to all because of the beauty and rhythm it will display. This feature act together with the Cycling Wheelers, Marie's Animal Circus, Carr Brothers, Pat Rafferty, the famous soldier singer of the Dumbells, and Rex Doyle, the boy with the million dollar personality and wonderful voice, are coming direct from the West after a seven weeks engagement to feature at Charlottetown Fair. They will be accompanied by a Master of Ceremonies and sound and lighting technician, with fascinating stage effects never before shown on a Maritime out-door stage.

Fireworks that thrill have been features of the Provincial Exhibition for the past three years, with the Gayde Girl Review, the preceding one. There will be no exception when the Big Fair starts August 15th, to 19th. On Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday will follow Empire Rockets, Dragon Rockets, Mammoth Floating Searchlight Rockets, Exhibition Bombshells which include Golden Balls, the National Colors, the Maharajah's Jewels, the Silver Chrysanthemum. Next we will see speices such as the Fountain of Wealth, streams of sparkling golden fire, each stream over twelve feet in length, the Umbrella Wheel, which appears as an embryo in golden dust, then golden spangles and fine, brilliant silver, the Jeweled Palm, the Floating Cascade Rocket and dozens of other wonderful and gorgeous fireworks, brilliant and colorful creations of the pyrotechnic art. Funeral Yesterday Of Mr. Justice F. L. Hazard

The funeral of Hon. Francis Longworth Hazard, 88-year-old retired Supreme Court Justice who died at his residence, Charlottetown, Saturday evening was held yesterday following a private service at the home of the late Mr. Hazard, St. Paul's Anglican Church where service was conducted by the Rev. H. D. Raymond, D. D., rector, assisted by the Rev. O. Lancaster of the Rev. Dr. Raymond officiated at the home and graveside in Sherwood Cemetery.

The funeral was attended by his many friends, members of the Bar Society, Premier Thome A. Campbell, and other members of the Provincial Government. The mourners were: Chief Justice J. A. Matheson, Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, Mr. Justice A. C. Saunders, Judge C. Gavan Duffy, Judge H. Palmer, and Messrs. Guy and Edwin Stewart, nephews of the late Supreme Court Justice.

Palbearers were: His Honour Lieutenant Governor George D. DeBols, Charles H. Chandler, H. H. Horne, W. E. Champton, W. R. Aitken and Henry Lowe.

A choir composed of members from the different city churches took part in the service at St. Paul's.

In Memoriam

MR. WILLIAM CURRAN
 In the passing of Mr. William Curran whose death occurred at his residence 210 Weymouth Street, Charlottetown, after only ten days' illness, the city has lost a highly respected and well known citizen.

Despite his 91 years, the late Mr. Curran continued his interest in public affairs, and being a constant reader, was well posted on current events. He retained his clear intellect almost up to the last.

Born in Tracadie the late Mr. Curran, when quite a young man removed to East Royalty where he farmed successfully for a number of years, after which he was appointed Road Supervisor and tax collector, in which position he gave entire satisfaction.

He leaves to mourn his loss the following: A W Curran, Medicine Hat; John A. manager of St. Regis Hotel, Calgary, Thomas, Boston; A. Curran, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Truro, N. S., and who arrived home a few hours before his father's death; Miss Mary E. Scott, City. His wife predeceased him about four years ago.
