Three sisters: Mrs. Murdoch MacLennan, Hartsville; Mrs. Donald MacLeod, and Mrs. Duncan Nicholson of Clyde Station; and one brother, Kenneth MacLennan of Hartsville, besides a large circle of friends and acquaintances are left to mourn.

Oats are selling on P. E. Island at 44 cents a bushel. The Government wants 100,000 bushels of seed for the North West. Major Henry Adams Cropley, one of the oldest and best known journalists in New Brunswick, died at his home here this morning, after a lingering illness from Bright's disease. He was born in Ireland, and when a young man came to this country with his father, who belonged to the 97th regiment, and for some time was stationed in this city, and afterwards in P. E. I. The deceased had been a resident of this city for many years. He was a printer by trade, and worked at the case in this city and in Boston. In 1880 he founded the Capital newspaper, conducting it first as a weekly and then as a tri-weekly. The paper ceased publication in 1889, but was revived as a monthly a few years ago. Mr. Cropley also conducted a job printing and stationery business. For many years he was prominently identified with the 71st regiment, and held the rank of major on his retirement in 1895. He was 70 years of age, and leaves a widow, formerly Miss Thorborne, of this city and one son, Robin H. Cropley, agent of the Star Line S.S. Company, and one daughter, Miss Annie E. The elder Major Cropley will be well remembered by many readers of the Guardian. He was for many years stationed at Victoria Barracks, Brighton.

Mark Wright, Newson's Block, is installing an up-to-date machine carpet cleaning plant. Housekeepers of Charlottetown will have an opportunity this spring of having their carpets, squares, rugs etc. thoroughly cleaned at small cost. This plant is now being set up and will be running next week. The motion power will be a 10 horse power gas engine (the same size and make as now drives The Guardian's Press). In addition to cleaning, when desired, for a small extra cost, the carpets are put through a thorough disinfecting process, by which disease germs, larvae, etc., are killed. The carpets are placed in a large wheel twelve feet in diameter in which the cleaning is done. This wheel is enclosed in an airtight room and a powerful fan creates a vacuum, and draws off the dust and dirt as shaken from the fabrics. This is much easier on carpet than the old method of beating with stick or whip.
