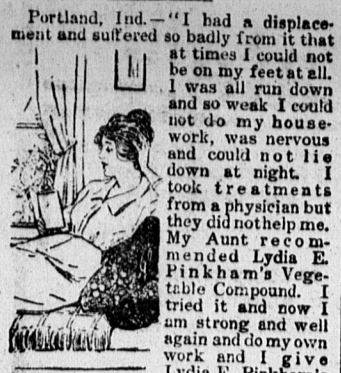

### BETTER OUTLOOK FOR CANADIAN BACON IN OVERSEAS MARKET

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Sir Thomas White stated tonight that his reports from overseas respecting the bacon situation were satisfactory. The British food ministry will purchase a large amount of tonnage immediately and the British market will be free for commercial purchases and importation after March 1 and for commercial sale and distribution after April 1.

This should provide a market for all exportable surplus of Canada under conditions satisfactory to producers and packers.

## Italy's Thanks For British Navy's Help

LONDON, Feb. 28.—The following letter of appreciation has been addressed to the British First Sea Lord by Admiral P. di Revel, commander-in-chief of the Italian Navy:

"With the advent of victory, at last achieved on all fronts, the co-operation of the British Navy in the operations in the Adriatic has come to an end, after 41 months of hard work, during which the British ships were always quick, willing, active, extremely useful, and efficient.

"Your navy has once more confirmed, also in this sea, her glorious traditions, and the bluejackets of the present generation have proved themselves worthy descendants of Nelson's comrades. Excellent comrades, valiant men of action, always eager to fight, they have fraternally shared with us all the dangers and hardships of a lengthy war, waged in strategical conditions of particular difficulty; they have shared with us the joy and glory of victory, which could not but come to the good cause. Some of them have had, in the Adriatic, the most honored resting place of a sailor, and their memory is sacred to us, while the remembrance of them all will be imperishable.

"The co-operation of the British Navy in the Adriatic is valued in its real and important moral and material value by the Italian Navy, and its remembrance will considerably contribute to maintain and strengthen that friendship that for so many years never failed to exist between our nations."

In reply, Sir Rosslyn Wemyss said: "The generous tribute you paid in your letter of Dec. 13 to the work of the British Navy in the Adriatic has touched me deeply, and I have read it with gratitude and pride. The officers and men of the squadron have, I know sought to carry out their duty—in this case a congenial duty, as they shared the traditional British feeling of friendship for Italy and Italy's cause that were again revived when Italy entered on her latest war of liberation: they will be proud to have earned your praise and esteem and friendship of the gallant Italian Navy.

"The British squadron have felt it a privilege to fight side by side with their Italian comrades in the Adriatic Sea in waging war against the enemies of right and justice. One pleasing result of the long years of the struggle, now happily crowned with victory, has been to permit the British naval officer and bluejacket to be associated with the Italian sailor, and today the British Navy can testify to the vitality of those traditions of Italian seamanship and valor which made the galleys of Venice famous in the old conflicts against the forces of barbarism."

### MONTCALM TO TRY FOR NEW RECORD ON ST. LAWRENCE

HALIFAX, Feb. 27.—The ice-breaker Montcalm which accompanied the new steamer Canadian Voyager to Halifax from Quebec, and which it was expected would lay up in Halifax for the winter, will likely make a try for the St. Lawrence at an early date, and thus establish, if she succeeds in getting to Quebec another midwinter record.

The Montcalm is now in drydock undergoing repairs to rudder and having new propeller blades fitted. She came down the St. Lawrence late in January and if she can get up again in March she will have a record both ways.

## IT IS EASY TO FIX THE RESPONSIBILITY ON THE NATION WHICH STARTED THE WAR

Sub-Committee of the Peace Conference.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—The sub-committee of the Peace Conference dealing with the responsibility of the authors of the war has completed its work. Its report has not been made public, but as its meetings and the hearings it gave were attended by nearly all the members of the full committee there seems no doubt that the report will receive formal approval and be laid before the Supreme Council.

It is believed that the sub-committee has made findings only as to the moral responsibility of the authors of the war and not as regards technical solutions of international law by individuals.

Other sub-committees dealing with various phases of responsibility for the war have not yet reached the point of reporting their findings.

PARIS, Feb. 24.—The official communication on the Peace Conference today says:

"The representatives of the Allied and associated governments met today at the Quai D'Orsay from 3 to 5 p. m.

"The Albanian representatives were introduced and Turkish Pasha stated the Albanian claims. The extension of the question was referred to the committee on Greek affairs.

"The Paris Inter-Allied Commission on Polish affairs communicated certain information and proposals received from the Inter-Allied Commission now at Warsaw. Marshal Foch was present.

"The next meeting will be held February 25 at 3 p. m."

PARIS, Feb. 24.—The following official communication was issued this evening:

"The Allied representatives today heard Turkish Pasha on the Albanian claims, which were referred to the committee on Greek affairs.

"The commission on Polish affairs communicated information and proposals from Warsaw commission."

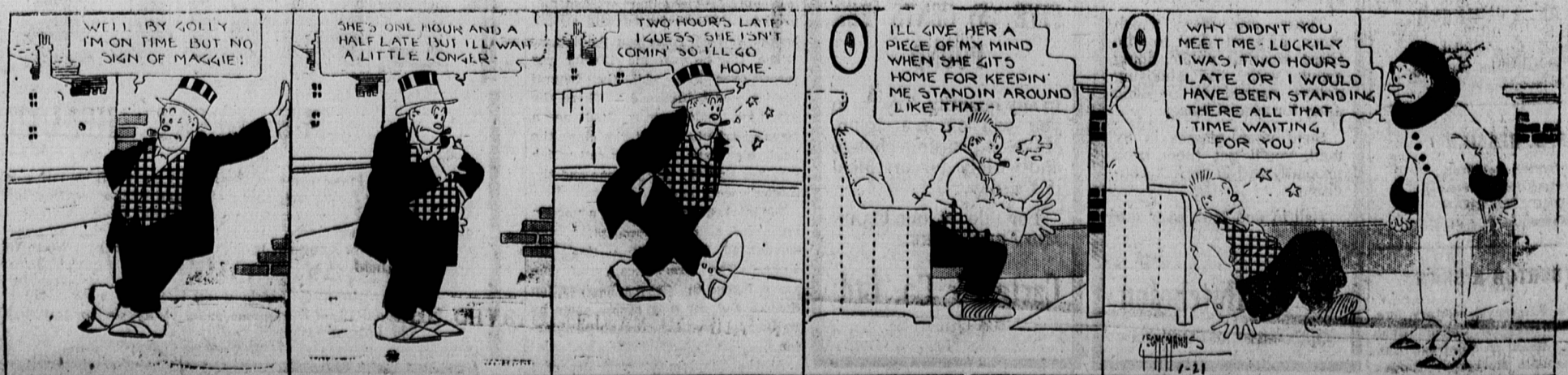
