Monday—Grow More Popular

"WOLF OF MOSCOW" AND WE HAVE BEEN EXECUTED

MOSCOW, June 23.—Ivan Komarov, known as "The Wolf of Moscow," convicted of murdering 33 persons since 1921 and his wife were executed Monday night by a firing squad.

Throughout his trial Komarov had affected a bravado but after his conviction he endeavored in every way to save his life. First he appealed for a new trial, and when this was denied, he pleaded with the government for clemency.

Komarov was a former Moscow cabinet officer. He was arrested last month on a charge of having murdered 33 persons, 22 of the bodies of whom were found in the cellar of his house, and were contained in sacks. When arrested he made escape by jumping from a window and was at large for a while. Later he was taken into custody while writing a confession of his crimes. The confession involved his wife and other persons. He said all the victims were killed while attending tea parties in his home, where they had been invited for the purpose of robbery.

A Judge's Regret.

LONDON, June 23.—Dealing a case in the Divorce Court Mr. Justice Hill said he always regretted that a wife should ask for a judicial separation when the circumstances justified divorce, but wives were within the law in asking for that form of relief.

He regretted that it was not within his power in the case before him to insist on making a decree of divorce, but it was not in his power if the wife chose to ask for something else.

Among Pigmies and Gorillas

LONDON, June 23.—Thrilling adventures in the heart of Africa are related by Prince William of Sweden in his book just published, "Among Pigmies and Gorillas."

The Swedish Zoological Expedition to Central Africa, planned ten years ago, was not realized until 1921. Commencing on the east coast, and passing through the Dark Continent, the scientists finished nine months later on the north coast. Their total "bag" was 1,000 mammals, 1,700 birds, and 10,000 insects for the Riks museum.

How the First Pram Was Built

LONDON, June 23.—Although there are three million baby carriages—popularly known as "prams"—in this country the history of the industry has never been told.

This was remarked by Samuel J. Sewell, who gave a lecture on the subject at the Society of Arts. He said he regarded the names "perambulator" and "bassinetto" as unsatisfactory.

Perambulator was derived from "per" and "ambulam," meaning to walk through or over and would be better applied to the person who wheeled the vehicle. "Bassinetto" was a French word, meaning a cradle made of wicker.

In 1780 the first "pram" was built, for Georgina Dorothy Cavendish, daughter of the fifth Duke of Devonshire. Two were constructed by a coachmaker, and both were still preserved at Chatsworth.

It was an interesting question remarked Mr. Sewell what became of the 50,000 "prams" discarded every year. Fifty per cent. were undoubtedly renovated, but the destination of the remainder was not connected, perhaps, with the soap-box motors which were the delight of boys.

LONDON, June 23.—Mrs. Stanley Baldwin, wife of the Prime Minister, described hospitals as "beacon lights of unselfishness and self-sacrifice" when she opened a garden fete in aid of the West London Hospital in the grounds of Chiswick House.

Conservative Convention at Georgetown

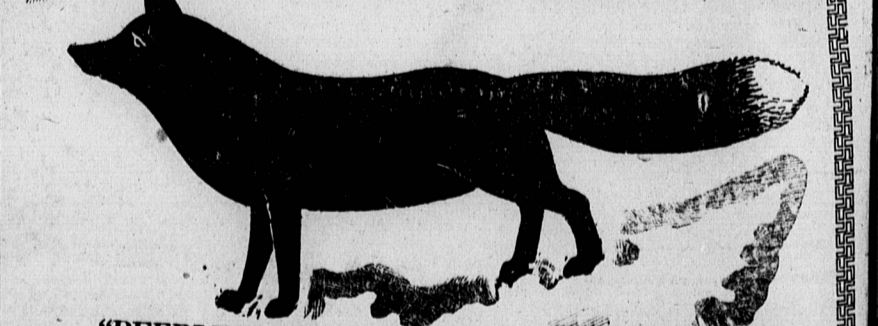
