Ontario Interested in Adult Education

TORONTO, April 17 (CP)—An Ontario "outing" with ideas in adult education, Ross M. Winter, director of the newly-organized Ontario Adult Education Board, said today in an interview on his return from an extensive examination tour of the province.

He said he found people did not want "dry lectures" but activities in which they could participate, such as courses in citizenship, science, hobbies, music and drama.

CONTROL OF LICE

With the advent of warm weather the problem of control and eradication of the common chicken louse often causes much concern. Sodium fluoride or derris root powder are effective control measures. If either of these powders is used, it is necessary to handle the birds individually.

If the birds are not heavily infested, a sprinkling of the powder in the fluff around the vent will be sufficient. If heavily infested, it will be necessary to apply some powder under the wings. Black kerosene may also be used. It is applied in a thin line along the roosts just before the birds go to roost. The fumes released by the action of the heat from the body of the birds will kill the lice. It is important to provide ample ventilation in the house, as the fumes, if concentrated, will affect the birds.

It is important to remember that only the louse and not the eggs are destroyed by treatment. This necessitates a second application a week later, otherwise, the first treatment will not be of much value. When hens are used for hatching or brooding, dusting must be done two weeks in advance of their receiving the chicks. If the chicks become infested, do not dust, but use a little larvicide carbolic vasoline, and rub it on top of their heads.

ICE ANAESTHETIC USED SUCCESSFULLY

LONDON, April 17—The Daily Sketch today reported that the Glasgow Royal Infirmary had completed a successful leg amputation, employing four-inch ice layers as anæsthetic.

The patient, a 70-year-old man, was said to be completely comfortable after the operation in which his leg was anaesthetized by resting in the ice grad for six hours. Bleeding and shock were reported reduced to a minimum.

FEAR AND FAITH

There is no surer means by which a Christian can test the adequacy of his personal religion than by its success or failure in dissolving fear. Religion, it is true, supplies only one of various methods by which fear can be counteracted. It may be neutralised by a deliberate reassurance, a glowing of the eyes to unwelcome facts. It may be repressed, at least at moments of crisis, by a resolute act of the will, an effort rightly gaining the name of courage. But the action of Christian faith upon fear is of a different kind; it neither ignores nor represses, but dissolves fear, causing it to vanish like snow in spring sunshine. Of all remedies for fear this is the most effective and enduring, and it was used by our Lord Himself.

These are days when to study our Lord's attitude towards fear is especially instructive. Clearly he regarded it as a malady, a poison, a source of evil and misery, from which man needed deliverance. The truth of that view has become most evident. The ultimate aim of the United Nations is not merely to devise formulas, or frame verbal agreements, but to end those conditions, distasteful in our eyes, those fears which, if left to rankle and increase, may engender wars. Our Lord was more directly concerned with the effects of moral disease on the individual life. He lived in Palestine at a time when every man's heart was failing them because of fear. He saw that fear caused much wrong-doing and was the source of misery to the victims. Yet in his view it was utterly needless. BRITONS MIGRATE TO SOUTH AFRICA

JOHANNESBURG, April 17 — Hundreds of British ex-servicemen, most of them skilled artisans, are making every effort to come to South Africa to settle.

The London office of the 1820 Memorial Settlers' Association has been sent to England to help with the rush of work.

At least 500 former members of the R. A. F. who left their South African wives in the Union, will be arriving in this country in batches as shipping becomes available and will all reach the Union long before the end of this year.

Apart from these 500 men, there are hundreds of British ex-servicemen engaged to South African girls, most of whom have jobs to come to, and they too are trying to get to the Union as soon as possible.

WILL START CAR-PHONE SERVICE SOON

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17 — Motorola in Northern California and parts of Nevada will be offered radio-telephone service between their automobiles and homes or offices, within two months the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. said today.

Company officials said the new communication facilities will be ready on an experimental basis by June, and already 57 persons have filed applications for the service.

Lyle Brown, P. T. and T. division manager, said motorists will merely have to lift a hand telephone off the dashboard to call office or home.

Brown said the transmitting pole, enclosing a co-axial cable for connection radio and wire facilities, is being installed on top of the telephone building here and at several other points in the bay area.

Rates for the service have not yet been set, but Brown said it was possible they would not be much more than current monthly rates for home service.

SPRAY ENDS COUNT FOR WARBLE FLY

TORONTO, April 17 — The worrisome warble fly's number is up — at least that is the hope of Ontario farmers who are this spring for the first time treating their cattle with the new pressure-spray method.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture have three spraying units touring the country and already more than 10,000 head and dairy type cattle have been sprayed.

The warble fly gives cattle a hard time during the warm weather when they take wing to bite the unsuspecting cattle in the hide along the back. In the bite they lay an egg. The egg hatches under the skin and the larvae feed on the pus formed under the resulting sore. The inch long infant finally emerges through the festered hole with the result the animal's skin is severely marked.
