CHICAGO, March 18—(AP)—Death of offerings, commission house buying, possibility of export trade with France and Erie, and a drive by farm bloc congressmen to higher partly payments combined today to boost wheat prices as much as 2 1/8 cents a bushel at times.

Wheat closed 1 1/2-2 cents a bushel higher, May 87 7/8-3 1/4, July 84 7/8-3 1/4; corn was 1-1 3/8 up, May 64 1/4-3 1/8, July 64 1/4-3 1/8, and oats advanced 1 1/8-5 1/8 cents.

WINNIPEG, March 18—(CP)—A strong showing at Chicago prompted sufficient buying to boost wheat prices moderately on Winnipeg grain exchange today as sellers made themselves scarce. At the time close quotations were 1 1/2-5 1/8 cent higher. May wheat at 78 3/8 and July 80 1/8 cents a bushel.

Buenos Aires prices held unchanged.

Airmen Appreciate Red Cross Aid

A Red Cross outpost nurse, who is experiencing her first winter in the bush 1000 miles from Toronto, has received a message of gratitude from Trans-Canada Air Lines for the assistance she gave when their first plane crash occurred near the village of Armstrong earlier this month. A letter from Trans-Canada, signed by the vice-president, D. B. Colyer, was read to the annual meeting of the Ontario Division, Canadian Red Cross Society, held at the Hotel Murray on Monday. Mr. Colyer expressed his personal appreciation for the assistance given by the nurse, Miss Helen Elliott, and Dr. L. L. Murray, in charge of the Red Cross hospital, at the time of the disaster which killed twelve passengers.

Miss Elliott's letter describing her connection with the tragedy, revealed that, at the first word of the accident, she had assembled her equipment and waited in readiness all day to start out in a blind-ice storm. The outpost at Armstrong is 125 miles from the nearest settlement in a region of lumber camps and mines. Early in the morning, Dr. Murray and Miss Elliott got their first call. The formation went to the airport at Armstrong to wait until the wreck was located; Miss Elliott, with an extra lot in her sterilizer, gathered some supplies and stood by.

In her letter she said: "At noon word came the plane had been in what direction from us. Then the line went dead and it was not until all the rest of Canada knew, that we discovered that the storm had brought the line down. Then at 4.30 we got word that they were all dead. There was no need of me at the moment since they were six in the morning I took the train to the air port. There was, of course, nothing I could do but there were two women with no other woman to do anything for them. I looked after them. No one lived to face even a minute's horror. That is the only comfort to be gleaned but it was all pretty grim. This terrible, lonely wilderness. It was the feeling of the desolation out here that was harder to deal with than the sight of their poor faces."

Miss Elliott also revealed that one of the rescue party who worked all night by the moon dragging the bodies across the snow on toboggans, was a former Outpost patient. He was a young lad who had shot away the tendons of his arm the previous July, and simple as the hospital equipment was, the staff of two performed a delicate operation of skin grafting and cured him.

The Red Cross nurse who pre-vides over the three-bed, white frame Outpost, is a native of Galt, Ontario. She was in the library for six years before she trained at the Hamilton General Hospital and
