by train to Sherwood Cemetery.

Messrs. Saunders & Newsom received
a car-load of choice cattle from Kensing-
ton yesterday. Among them were two
very choice steers fed by Wm. Profit.
They tipped the scale at 2620 lbs, 1 choice
steer fed by Herbert Donalds weighing
1485 lbs, and 2 choice steers weighing 2725
lbs fed by Frank Tuplin, New Annan.

Major Taylor, the colored cyclist who is
well known to the Island boys who at-
tended the world's meet in Montreal has
been reinstated by the executive com-
mittee of the American Racing Cyclists'
Union in session at Newark, N. J. The
sentence of life suspension which stood
against him was commuted to a fine of
\$100, but in addition to this he is amenable
to the Union for \$440 money lost
by the riders through the desertion of
Taylor at Cape Girardeau, in the fall
of 1898. He will willingly pay the \$500.
The N. C. A. will now reinstate him.

town reservoir is 2,000,000 gallons but on

in the three provinces, thus making it a
valuable means of advertising.

YESTERDAY a number of small boys

THE many readers of THE GUARDIAN
will be pleased to read that Rev. John B.
Champion formerly of Alberton has re-
ceived the degree of B. A. with first class
distinctions in political economy and phi-
losophy Mr. Champion is a graduate of
the University of New Brunswick.
Having taken the preparatory training at
Prince of Wales College, he entered
Acadia College with the class of '94. After
completing two years there, ill health
compelled the relinquishment of further
college work for five years. Providence
kindly in due time gave the opportunity
of completing the work here, and though
carrying the extra work and work of a
church pastorate he has been fortunate
enough to make first class in six out of
the seven subjects of the senior year. At
the end of June coming he expects to
leave for Hamilton, N. Y., to enter upon
the B. D. course in Colgate University.

THE regular meeting of the school
trustees was held last evening. The
teachers' report shows the enrollment to
be 1359, the average attendance 1084 and
percentage 88.9; No. cases tardiness 199;
No. truants 27; No. visits 204; No. cases
corporal punishment 22; fell below in
grading 71; requests to leave school 174.
Highest percentage in Prince St. School
was made in Principal Seaman's room 92;
in Queen's Square, Miss Farmer's 95; in
West Kent Mr. Owen's 94. Miss Scott,
and Mr. Owen reported no cases tardiness.
The question of two sessions came
up for discussion. A counter petition was
received signed by 216 parents asking that
the school sessions remain as at present.
After some discussion it was agreed that
the matter lie on the table for future con-
sideration. Matter of issuing debentures
came up and it was agreed that the fol-
lowing committee be authorized to make
arrangements for issuing them, namely
Mr. McLeod, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Handra-
han, and the Chairman. It was decided
that the schools close for mid-summer
holidays on Thursday 28th inst and re-
open on the 4th September.
