BRITISH POUND DROPS 13 CENTS

NEW YORK, June 28.-(CP) - The British pound dropped 13 cents on the foreign exchange market today, losing exactly half of Thursday's last run-up. The market is forced 'free' sterling to \$3.87 in relation to the United States dollar, roughly 11 cents away from the pre-war level of 4.76. Money men said the decline appeared to confusion regarding details of steps the British Control Board is taking toward the elimination of the free market. Many banks predict such a step is imminent.

SURVEY CONTINUES

The geophysical survey of the Hillsborough Bay area which was commenced about a month ago by the subsidiary of the Cities Service Company of New York who hold the concession of oil rights in the Province formerly held by Mr. Hugh MacKay of Nova Scotia, is progressing rapidly. Dr. L. C. Snider, consulting geologist of the Cities Service Company, said last night that seismograph records were being made to ascertain the rock bed structures of the Bay. Work has been done at Orwell Cove, Chignik Point and at present around Point Prim. Nothing definite has been found to indicate the presence of oil in the area. The survey taking place at present is to determine whether or not the structure of the rock is favorable for oil. It would then be necessary to drill and even with favorable rock structure there is always the possibility that no oil will be found. In the years 1925-28 oil drilling operations took place on Governor's Island in the Bay. A depth of 6,000 feet was drilled at that time and the equipment was brought back to the company. At present no further operations were started. At present it is possible to drill over twice that depth.
