**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

The funeral of the late George Frooter took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. The services were conducted at the house and grave by Rev. L. Williams, assisted by Rev. J. W. McConnell. The pall-bearers were Messrs. E. F. Parry, Nathaniel Beardon, W. F. Colwill and John R. Egan. The interment was in People's Cemetery.

SELDOM is it given to an audience to hear a more scholarly or better rendered lecture than that of Prof. Cayen in the basement of St. Dunstan's Cathedral last evening. In faultless language he led his hearers through the chief incidents in the life of Cardinal Wiseman and enraptured them by a learned analysis of his principal works. Few men in our City are better fitted for such a task, for few have such a thorough knowledge of English Literature as the Professor, and few have a better command of phrase and charming diction. Those who heard him last evening will long to hear him again. A vote of thanks moved by C. G. Duffy and seconded by John T. Clarkin, B. A., was tendered to the lecturer by the Chairman, Rev. Dr. Morrison.

A GOOD audience assembled in St. James Hall last evening to hear Rev. T. F. Fullerton deliver his third lecture on the Australian Commonwealth. The lecturer in his opening remarks made reference to the meeting of the Colonial Premiers recently held in London and expressed the hope that it would result in the future of the unification of the Colonies. The lecture was beautifully illustrated with stereopticon views, including Hawkebury River Bridge, Town of New Castle, Monument Hill, Timber Lands, Broken Hill silver mine, McQuarrie Falls etc. The lecturer vividly described the different phases of life throughout the country, the habits of the negro, and as well a description of mine work. This is the last lecture on this year's Y. M. L. A. course. The closing event will be an entertainment on the evening of March 24.

A QUEENSTOWN, Ireland despatch of the 3rd says: The Dominion Line steamer Merion, which arrived here yesterday, from Boston Feb 20 for Liverpool, is aground near Roche's Point, White Bay, and is in a dangerous position. Part of the passengers and crew are on board.

A MEETING of the Dundas Farmers Institute was held in Bridgetown Hall on Thursday Feb. 28th., at 7 o'clock, a large crowd was in attendance considering the short notice. The meeting was called to order by the President C. B. Clay, and the undersigned was appointed Secretary. The President explained that the object of the meeting was to arrange for a joint meeting of the Dundas and Red House Institutes for the purpose of pressing the claims of the residents of Dundas, Annandale and Bay Fortune for better railway facilities. After short speeches in favor of the proposed agitation by William McLeod and Geo. E. Saville, the following resolution was moved by Mr. Saville and seconded by Mr. McLeod and carried. That the Dundas and Red House Farmers Institute hold a joint meeting in the hall at Bridgetown on Saturday March 7th, at 2 o'clock p. m. to discuss the proposed railway. All parties interested are invited to attend this meeting and the following public men are also invited to attend, viz: J. J. Hughes, M. P., John McLean M. L. A., Hon. Thomas Kitcham, W. A. O. Morson, Jas. E. McDonald, Nathaniel McLaren, Hon. D. Gordon, G. I. Inman, Senator Robertson, A. J. McDonald.

THE death occurred at midnight (Monday night) at Cavendish, at the residence of his grandson, Mr. Robert McKenzie, of D. R. M. Hooper, Esquire, aged 95 years. After being engaged in farming at Milton for many years he removed to Charlottetown, where he carried on a general mercantile and shipping business. He was Mayor of this City from 1883 to 1884, being in the Council Board for many years previously, and was highly esteemed and respected by all classes of citizens. He leaves to mourn one sister, Mrs. D. Mathieson, of Rustico, two daughters, Mrs. John Stewart, of Bay View, and Mrs. J. W. Mitchell, of Charlottetown, and a number of grand children, great grand children and great great grand children. Councillor D. L. Hooper is a nephew of the deceased. During his residence in Charlottetown the late Mr. Hooper became widely known in this city and wherever known was highly respected. His character was irreproachable and although of a retiring disposition he was prevailed upon to allow himself to be chosen to the high and honorable position of Mayor. His business relations brought him into contact with hosts of people in town and country, and his record in this regard stands high in the estimation of both farmers and business men. He was a man of sympathetic heart and generous hand and it can truly be said of him that he treated all men alike. By his demise Charlottetown loses its last ex-Mayor. The funeral will leave Cavendish for Milton Cemetery, arriving there about 2 o'clock p. m. today.

**EASTERN NOTES.**—In Charlottetown Newfound and Cape Breton we have experienced a severer winter than usual with a large quantity of snow on the ground. One cause, and perhaps the only cause, is, we have an immense body of ice in the Gulf this winter, and that of the heaviest description. While politicians may quote the terms of coniferation "continuous steam communication during winter," and while mill owners may talk of facilities of winter navigation of the Straits, no steamer ever has been built, or no steamer ever can be built that would navigate such ice as we have here at present.—Miss Lena Chapman and William Sutherland were married on the 24th inst.—The death of Mrs. Cassimir Campbell, Red Point, occurred on the 22nd inst, aged 83 years, her husband died 43 years ago. Of her ten children, three sons are in Oregon, two sons and three daughters at home, and two sons deceased, of whom, James was drowned in a shipwreck near Liverpool, N. S., a few years ago.—John J. Smith of New Perth is visiting his eastern friends now.—John D. McDonald now of East Point has been calling on his Red Point friends recently, they were all pleased to see that the vigorous air of East Point, apparently agrees well with him, constitutionally, and intellectually.—The farmers are slowly working at their work and rails, retarded by immense snow drifts and deep snow. By present appearances it will be a poor year for our numerous saw mills, as lumbermen find it nearly impossible to yard any large quantity of log.—Our bloods many of whom have appeared in new sleighs this winter are nearly discouraged, as they have had very few opportunities of displaying them with bad roads and stormy weather, and the sleighing season now should be drawing to a close.

Her largely attended funeral on Thursday was of a very solemn nature. During the singing nearly every one present was moved to tears, and we all felt that judging by every test Emma is indeed safe in the arms of Jesus, when saying adieu to her loved ones at the gate of Paradise, she made each one promise to meet her in Heaven. She leaves a sorrowing mother a brother and two younger sisters, at the home in North River, and two sisters who reside in British Columbia. She was the third daughter of the late George Hurry.
