Rev. W. H. Harding, a former pastor of the Christian Church, Summerside, arrived by the boat last evening and proceeded to Fredericton.

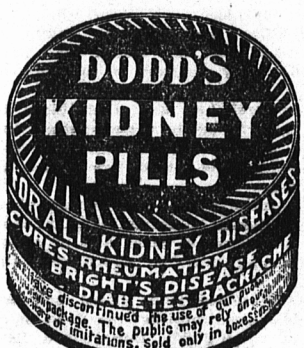
All members of the Summerside Labor and Truckmen's Union are requested to attend a meeting of the Union this evening at 7.30—Business of importance.

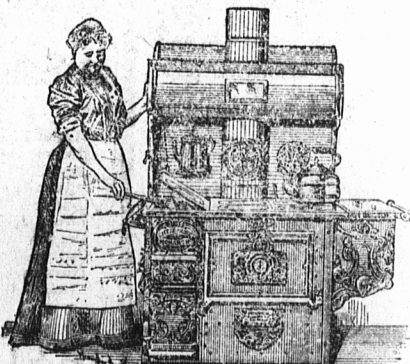
