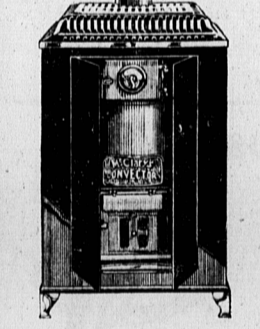

Baltimore Lawyer Assisted to Free Man From Prison

PAWNEE BROOCH PROVIDED A SEQUEL TO INVESTIGATION OF A MURDER CASE BY CON-AN DOYLE.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 17.—The American counterpart of Dr. Watson, companion character of Sherlock Holmes in the stories of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, has been revealed here as the result of the promised release from a British prison of Oscar Slater, who has served 18 years of a life sentence for the murder in 1909 of Miss Jane Gilchrist, aged spinster of Glasgow, Scotland.

In Slater's case the part of Watson has played by William Goodhart, Baltimore lawyer, Sir Arthur himself played the part of Holmes. Slater, who was Mr. Goodhart's client prior to 1908, was arrested in New York on instructions cabled by Scotland Yard detectives. They had discovered the cable said, that Slater had pawned a brooch during a trip to Scotland similar to one stolen from Miss Gilchrist.

Mr. Goodhart asserted that as Slater's attorney, he vainly fought his extradition. Slater was extradited, tried in Edinburgh and sentenced to life imprisonment.

A year later the creator of Sherlock Holmes became interested in the case. With Mr. Goodhart, who still believed in his client's innocence, he instituted a careful investigation.

Together they unearthed the fact that Slater had pawned the brooch several months before Miss Gilchrist was murdered. Goodhart asserted. They also learned that it had been the property of another woman and that Slater's visits to the pawn shop after the murder had been made for the purpose of raising more money on the pledge.

With such information Sir Arthur reconstructed the crime and demanded Slater's release. Mr. Goodhart said.

Advises from London, quoting Sir John Gilmore, Scotland's Secretary of State, as saying that Slater would be freed as soon as formalities had been completed, indicated that he had been successful.

Beams Have Rotted In Premier's House

LONDON, Nov. 17.—While workmen were repairing the roof of Chequers, the country house of the Prime Minister in Buckinghamshire recently, they found that some of the beams had rotted. It was decided for the safety of the building that iron girders must be used to replace the decayed beams. The work, which is now being done, is expected to occupy several months.

The maintenance of Chequers in the hands of the Chequers Trust, which was formed when Lord Lee of Fareham presented the house to the nation for the use of Prime Ministers.

Not long ago it was found necessary to carry out underpinning operations at 10 Downing Street, the London house of the Prime Minister.

Many tons of liquid concrete were pumped into the foundations to make the house secure.

seen at the time of the murder that police were following a false trail. They had committed themselves to such a point, however, he added, and lacked the moral courage to admit their error and get back to their original position.

"Now, after 20 years, it will be necessary to do so if we are ever to arrive at a true solution of the murder and clear up the scandal which reflects the utmost discredit upon the administration of law in Scotland," Sir Arthur wrote.

Prominent Man Is Involved In Famous Murder

LONDON, Nov. 16.—A warrant has been issued for the arrest of a prominent Briton, known to the public only by the initials "A. B.," in connection with the famous Oscar Slater case.

Slater, a near-do-well, was sentenced to life imprisonment in Peterhead penitentiary upon his conviction in 1908, as the murderer of Miss Marion Gilchrist.

After serving 18 years, Slater was pardoned, thanks to the persistence of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle who used Sherlock Holmes methods to prove him innocent.

Agitators for his release had likened his plight to that of Sacco and Vanzetti. He had been convicted on circumstantial evidence.

It is now believed that the police possessed strong evidence against the mysterious "A. B.," but hesitated to arrest him because of his high position.

HOUSE TAKES HAND.

The House of Commons took notice of the incident last week. A Parliamentary committee demanded that the Home Secretary re-open the case and lay bare all the evidence which Miss Helen Lambie, Miss Gilchrist's servant, gave the police, but which was suppressed because of the rank of the persons it involved.

Unanimously convinced of Slater's innocence the English press today declared the conviction the "greatest blot of the century on English justice."

Demand for reopening of the case is strengthened by the fact that higher courts recently have reversed a number of convictions said to have been obtained on false police testimony.

Slater was overcome with delight at his pardon and declared he would devote his life to proving his innocence. He has received scores of letters from persons offering financial aid. Rabbi P. Phillips of Glasgow, has announced he would open his home to the once condemned man.

Not satisfied with his disclosure, by Sherlock Holmes analysis and deduction of discrepancies in police evidence against Slater, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle intends to push the investigation until the guilty person is convicted.

"Discovery of the real slayer of Miss Gilchrist should not be difficult," Sir Arthur wrote in Sunday Empire News. Reviewing and analyzing the case, the creator of Sherlock Holmes emphasized the soundness of Miss Lambie's statement to police.

House Of David Colony Banned As Public Nuisance

RULE OF KING BENJAMIN FURNELL OVER THE PICTURE-SQUE RELIGIOUS CULT FOUNDED IN BENTON HARBOR ORDERED ENDED BY COURT.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Nov. 14.—The rule of King Benjamin Furnell over the picturesque religious cult he founded in Benton Harbor, a quarter of a century ago, was ordered ended today.

Supreme Court Judge Louis H. Peck, of New Berry, entered an order in the State's dissolution suit decreeing that a receiver shall take over control of the House of David colony and that Furnell, whom State alleged practiced fraud and immorality, must go into exile with his followers.

The court ruled he shall be banished from contact with those he is alleged to have mistreated by "complete and permanent removal from the colony grounds."

He may not associate with the girl colonists except under protective conditions.

The court agreed with the State that the colony was a public nuisance because of the teaching and practice of fraud, immorality, perjury and other illegal acts.

The plea of the State for abrupt dissolution of the cult, however, was denied. The court granted the members of the faith permission to continue their community life, carry on their religious teachings and operate their many enterprises, under the watchful eye of a receiver.

Many of the members, blameless and faithful, are not prepared to meet the problems of the outside world, Judge Peck decided.

Manitoba Wins Swine Championship

(Special to the Guardian.) TORONTO, Nov. 16.—Manitoba won the Dominion Championship for the boys and girls swine judging competition throughout the Dominion and the W. B. Robb trophy was presented to Albert Wilton and Mervin Anderson of Holland, as the winners of the Canadian contest.

By the winning of this prize Wilton and Anderson have won the distinction of being the best hog judges in the Dominion of Canada.

For some years past, W. D. Robb, Vice-President of the Canadian National Railways, has taken a deep interest in the livestock production of Canada, and as it has come under one of his departments, he generously saw fit to donate a cup for the younger generation to compete, this cup was donated about four years ago and as a result of Mr. Robb's interest, the improvement in the hog industry was unusually marked.

Each year the various boys and girls teams compete throughout the provinces for the honor of winning the trophy, emblematic of the championship of Canada, which is awarded at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto.

In the past, Mr. Robb's cup has been won by Ontario, Saskatchewan and now, by Manitoba.

Following a dinner, which Mr. Robb gave to the representatives of each province, the boys who proved themselves to be the best judges of their various provinces, Mr. Robb personally presented to each member of the team a gold medal for their provincial championship, and to the team from Manitoba, he also gave the cup.

TRAFFIC THROUGH PANAMA CANAL GREATER THAN ANY OTHER YEAR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Traffic through the Panama Canal for the fiscal year ended June 30 was greater than in any preceding fiscal or calendar year, according to the annual report of Governor M. L. Walker.

During the year a total of 6,072 seagoing vessels passed through the canal, and average of 166 a day against 5,749 in the fiscal year 1926.

Net transit revenue amounted to \$15,611,093.80, compared with \$15,151,668.06 in 1926, and the net revenue on business operations at the Canal Zone as represented in stores and other lines apart from the canal itself was \$376,526.80, compared with \$341,810.28 in the preceding year.
