## C. N. R. Earnings Show Increase

TORONTO, Dec. 31.—Gross earnings for the Canadian National Railways, including the Grand Trunk Pacific, Canadian Government Railways and the old Canadian Northern Railway, show an increase during November of \$32,632.39, while the working expenses decreased \$15,686.65, making a total increase in net earnings for the month of \$48,319.04. From January 1st to December 31st the gross earnings show a falling off of \$5,993,567.78, but as the working expenses are \$13,394,898.45 less than a year ago, the net earnings are \$7,452,190.70 greater than a year ago.

### THE LATE DUNCAN SHAW

The passing of the late Duncan Shaw formerly of Summerside, which took place at the home of his nephew Mr. M. Albert Shaw on Tuesday morning last will be of interest to many of the older people of Prince County where Mr. Shaw for many years made his home as well as in this Province and in other parts of Canada. The late Mr. Shaw had reached the age of 89 years and during his life exhibited that strong physique and sterling character which are characteristic of the early Scottish settlers in this country. He was a son of the late Malcolm Shaw of Summerside and the second of three children of which family now living is Miss Jean Shaw, who resides in Canada. Mr. Shaw was a strong supporter of the Presbyterian Church in Summerside and was a consistent Christian all his life and often took occasion to express his unbounded faith in the future. His last days and hours were of that character of peace and confidence. The funeral which was held at the family place at Summerside on Wednesday last was well attended. Rev. Thomas Wilton performed the services. Interment was made in the family plot at Covehead Presbyterian Church cemetery.
