WILL THE SESSION BE SHORT?

It is given out that the coming session of Parliament, which will begin at Ottawa on January 11 will probably be a short one. The assumption is that little will be done except voting the supplies. It is stated that nothing will be done in the way of tariff revision. It does not follow, however, that the session will be short. When the members are called together early in the winter they are disposed to take things in a leisurely fashion. There will be many new members who must make their maiden speeches and these must be listened to. There will be many matters in relation to the past election to be threshed out, charges to be made and answered. Throwing of supply must needs occupy six weeks or more. Sir Wilfrid has promised to deal with Northwest autonomy, and if he does not there will be trouble among the territorial representatives. If the question is taken up we may expect a long and probably bitter fight over the matter of separate schools for the new Province. The Opposition have much to say as to whether a session shall be long or short. Some of them speak frequently and at length. It is risky to predict a short session. Mr. Foster is again in Parliament.

A VERY CORRUPT LEGISLATURE.

Thomas W. Lawson, a financier of wealth and repute, has contributed a series of articles on "Frenzied Finance" to Everybody's Magazine, which have quadrupled the circulation of that serial and run it well up to the million mark. The articles are still running and growing in the intensity of their interest. He boldly exposes the calculating rascality of men and corporations high in the American financial world, giving names, dates and documentary evidence such as gives to his thrilling and dramatic story every appearance of truth. High crimes and misdemeanors figure in the story, which would be incredible, but for the boldness and circumstantiality with which the attack is made. The latest issue openly charges that the Massachusetts Legislature is the most corrupt legislative body in the world, and the particulars given as to its purchase by Henry M. Whitney, furnish a thrilling chapter that is of interest to Canadians. For the same Mr. Whitney has operated extensively in Nova Scotia steel and coal. Space today will only permit a single quotation from Mr. Lawson's charge against the Massachusetts Legislature; which is as follows: "I do not hesitate to say that the Massachusetts Legislature is bought and sold as are sausages and fish at the markets and wharves. That the largest, wealthiest, and most prominent corporations in New England, whose affairs are conducted by our most representative citizens, habitually corrupt the Massachusetts Legislature, and the man of wealth among them who would enter protest against the iniquity would be looked on as a 'class anarchist.' I will go further and say that if in New England a man of the type of Folk, of Missouri, can be found who will give over six months to turning up the legislative and Boston municipal sod of the past ten years, who does not expose to the world a condition of rottenness more rotten than was ever before exhibited in any community in the civilized world, it will be because he has been suffocated by the stench of what he exhumes."

RECIPROCITY.

It is given out that President Roosevelt will issue a special message to Congress in favor of reciprocity with Canada. He finds that the feeling in New England and in the northwestern and border states generally tends in the direction of freer trade across the boundary, and he is willing to bill for the favor of those who feel that way. It seems not to have occurred to the President that it takes two to make a bargain, and that for the success of his proposal it is necessary that it shall find favor in Canadian as well as American eyes.

Moreover there are some things that Canadians have not forgotten. Among these are that our neighbors have never yet been willing to offer in the past fifty years any trade terms which were not notoriously in their own favor and against Canadian interests. And furthermore since President Roosevelt appointed the most notorious pledged partisans as "impartial jurists of repute" to serve on the Alaskan boundary tribunal, Canadians must look upon any proposal emanating from him in regard to reciprocity with distrust if not with suspicion.

And now we have leading Liberal journals of the west recommending the transfer of the Intercolonial Railway to a company, meaning the Grand Trunk. When that is done it will be an ill day for the Maritime Provinces.

Premier Parent, as the result of having played the Opposition at a disadvantage in the election has secured an overwhelming majority in the Legislature. But there are evidences that he has secured this gain at the cost of dividing and disintegrating his own party. Senator Legris, a lifelong Liberal, is out in open condemnation of the Liberal Premier. And the Montreal Witness closes a strong article on "The Case of Premier Parent" with the following words:

"His association with the heavily-bonused Quebec Bridge first brought misgiving to the public mind; then came the infamous trust legislation associated with his Government; and, recently, has come his arrogant and dictatorial endorsement of the worst member that Montreal has ever sent to Quebec. Mr. Parent is another example of the fruits of keeping bad company."

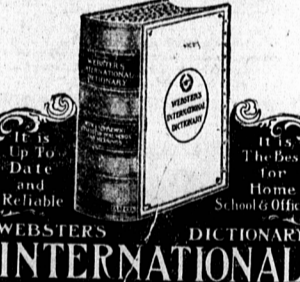
