The closing and exhibition of work of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild for 1948 and 1949 was held on Wednesday afternoon, June 15th, in the writing room of the Charlottetown Hotel.

Many members and friends were present to admire the work that the Guild had accomplished through the year.

The Protestant Orphanage was extremely well looked after, more garments being made for the children than ever before. Dresses, sweaters, suits, socks and underwear, all beautifully hand made, were sent over to the institution at the close of the display.

The birthday box sent to Her Majesty Queen Mary for her Majesty Hospital in London for the benefit of the wives of sailors, soldiers and airmen contained numerous hand knitted garments for babies.

In addition to the work many valuable contributions of money were received, making it possible to buy materials for next year's work.

The Guild has worked faithfully for over 30 years and through two wars has looked after the needs of the forces, and donated sums of money to various charitable projects.

No financial public appeal has been made and the members do not request any annual fee. The work is cut out, distributed and returned in time for the annual display.

Great sympathy was felt at the absence through accident of the president, Mrs. Putnam, and the treasurer, Mrs. Smallwood. Mrs. Gordon, an ex-president, was also present in Great Britain, and the honorary president, Mrs. Bartlett, was unable to be present. The work done by these valued members was a feature of the display.

Mrs. Gordon plans to visit the Queen's Hospital while in London and will bring back a report of the work of that institution and voice their appreciation of the continued interest taken by the Charlottetown branch in the Queen Mary Maternity Home.

ANSWER: It doesn't appear from your account that your sinner has really committed any sin. But anyway, if I had to live with either woman, I would certainly choose as a companion the one who occasionally stubs her toe because she is so busy helping others along the road that she doesn't watch her step as carefully as she should to the woman who walks the straight and narrow path without ever holding out a hand to one in trouble.

Of course, it is a fine thing for a woman to be a good housekeeper, but it is not the most important virtue that a wife and mother can possess. Some of the most uncomfortable houses I have ever visited in were as clean as a pin and had excellently prepared meals, but the women at the head of them were naggers and scolds and were such slaves to order that no one dared move for fear of disturbing things.

And I have been in other homes where everything was at sixes and sevens and the food enough to poison an ostrich, but where the wives and mothers diffused such gaiety and good nature that they made their homes a place of refuge to which their children flew from the world. But, fortunately, a woman can be both a good housekeeper and a jolly good fellow. You don't have to choose between one or the other.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I am a lonely widow, 55 years old, my children all grown up and married. I have an offer of marriage from a man of another nationality. Would you advise me to marry him or go and live with one of my children?

ANSWER: If the man is fine and honorable and all that she should be, his nationality does not matter, unless he wishes to take you to his own country to live. Very few American women are ever happy in foreign countries where the ways, and particularly the ways of husbands with wives, are different from ours.

But if the man is at all eligible you will be happier with him than you will be living with your children. A woman who is used to her own home does not fit easily into her children's.

HOLDING UP HEAD

KEEPS CHIN SLIM
One of the most reliable instincts a woman can follow when she sees the first signs of a double chin in her mirror is to hold up her head. If she'll hold her head up—erect, that is, and in perfect alignment
