GOES ASHORE IN A DENSE FOG

CANSO, April 27—While approaching this harbor this afternoon in a dense fog, the Gloucester fishing schooner Niagara, Captain Kilpatrick struck on Washball shoal, southeast of Cranberry Island light, and will probably be a total wreck, owing to the very heavy sea heaving in. Captain Kilpatrick left Gloucester on Thursday and encountered thick fog and east wind all down the coast. Having made the bell buoy off the eastern entrance to the harbor, a course was set which the captain judged would carry him up the right channel, but which carried the vessel near the point of Cranberry. Breakers were sighted and the vessel swung her off was given, but too late, and the Niagara struck hard and fast on the rocks. Poolling heavily, her timbers soon started and before many minutes the vessel settled until the forecabin floor was under water. Captain Kilpatrick and his crew took to their dories and reached Canso about six o'clock. Tugs will go out at daylight but small hope is entertained that much will be left of the wrecked schooner.

HEROES WHO DIED IN A SULMARINE

KOBE, Japan, April 27—A story of the heroism of the Japanese naval men was found today in the memorandum of the lieutenant-commander of the Japanese submarine which sank in the harbor at Kure last Friday. The submarine was raised and opened today, revealing that its three officers and eleven men had been asphyxiated.

The memorandum carefully explained the mechanical causes of the boat's sinking, and described the attempts to refloat it. The lieutenant praised the courage of his subordinates, all of whom said they were glad to die for Japan. Their last request was that the emperor would provide for their families.

The memorandum was continued until the writer was overcome, as he described the painful breathing of himself and comrades.

BELCOURT BILL IS TO BE DROPPED

OTTAWA, April 27—There was an interesting discussion in the senate today upon Senator Belcourt's bill to amend the criminal code. It subjects all labor unions to the statutes against conspiracy unless all their members are British subjects and is designed to break up international unionism. There was general opposition to the measure. Senator Power of Halifax vigorously denounced the United Mine Workers as an international organization which has inflicted tremendous injuries upon Nova Scotia, and especially upon the miners of that province. At the same time he could not support any measure which would levelled against international unions like the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Senator Cloran denounced the bill in unmeasured terms. He said the Canadian laboring men might as well ask for legislation forbidding Canadian corporations to have any shareholders who were not British subjects. The bill will be dropped for this season.

MILK WAR IN BOSTON DECLARED

BOSTON, April 27—A declaration of war between milk producers and contractors in the so-called Boston district with the innocent consumers as the principal sufferers probably, was proclaimed today by the producers at the close of a meeting at the American House. It is expected that hostilities will begin on May 1. The fight is on the rate per can of 32 quarts. The producers demand 33-1/2 cents, their rate paid during the winter, while the contractors have decided to maintain the 25 cent rate which has obtained during the summer months, for the past three years. The meeting here today was attended by fifty farmers, who claimed that they represented nearly 5,000,000 cans of milk daily. If the declaration of war is carried into effect a milk famine in Boston seems possible.

The contractors who handle the milk in this city, expressed the opinion today that many of the farmers would not hold to the action taken today, and there was a sufficient number of producers not in the association to keep Boston from being milkless.

BIG TIMBER DEAL IN NEWFOUNDLAND

BANGOR, Me., April 27—Details of the Anglo-American Development Company's recent deal in Labrador timber lands were made public here today by Chas. D. Stanford and R. H. King of Bangor, who are members of the syndicate that has acquired the rights obtained by the Anglo-American Company from the Newfoundland government. The tract comprises 13,853 square miles, or 8,865,000 acres, densely covered with spruce, the present stand being estimated conservatively at thirty billion feet, equal to 50,000,000 cords of pulpwood. The company's recent deal in Labrador pulpwood.

For the right to cut over this territory for the period of fifty years, with the privilege of forty-nine years' renewal, the Anglo-American Company, organized last August at St. John's (Nfld.), contracted to pay to the Newfoundland government a rental amounting to \$4 per square mile for the first year and \$2 per square mile for each subsequent year, and the syndicate which has taken over the lease has just paid for the first year's rental, amounting to \$85,412.
