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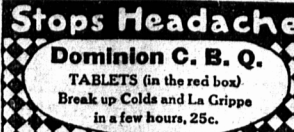

Fur Prices Soaring

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—All previous records for a single days sales were exceeded at the Fur Auction in the Masonic Temple here today when a total of \$1,200,000 was rolled up. This brought the grand total to date up to \$2,200,000.

The sum paid by the buyers for their skins today was considered all the more unusual from the fact that not one of the nearly 600,000 pelts sold brought a price higher than \$43. It was the great quantities of most of the varieties offered that did the trick of the collection of furs alone containing nearly 240,000 skins.

Prices ran high for the kinds of skins sold and it is now apparent that the public is going to pay even more for its manufactured furs in the near future than is now the case. Among the day's notable individual sales was the disposal of the entire offering of flying squirrel to a leading French buyer at prices 10 per cent higher than this far advanced at the Spring sale.

Other average advances over the April sale that were scored today ranged from 10 per cent on flying squirrel and Australian Opposum to 60 per cent on Nutria. The only decline in the sale so far occurred today when the price of Australian Fox dropped 20 per cent below the April sale averages. Marten and several other important Canadian and American furs will come up for sale tomorrow.

NIGHT OF TERROR FOR SPANISH CITY

MADRID, Oct. 7.—Many casualties have resulted, it is feared, from the floods caused by excessive rains throughout the country, particularly in the city of Cartagena, the inhabitants of which spent a night of terror Wednesday night, owing to the inundation of the lower parts of the city. The town was in complete darkness owing to the interruption of gas and electric light service. The inhabitants, who had taken refuge in the upper floors, crowded the windows and balconies, appealing for help. The mounted police did their utmost to rescue them, swimming their horses neck deep in water to rescue the terrified inhabitants, but were eventually obliged to abandon their efforts in consequence of the rising waters.

First reports gave twenty-two casualties in Cartagena and it is feared that there have been many more victims, especially in the suburbs. Damage from the floods is widespread particularly in the province of Valencia, Alicante and Murcia. Railroads are cut in many places. Traffic in Valencia, a town of almost 200,000 inhabitants, is stopped. Telegraph and telephones are down. No newspapers are published in many places.
