THE PENITENTIARIES.

The annual report of the penitentiaries of Canada shows that at the end of the year 1898 there were 1,446 convicts in these institutions, being an increase of 64 over the previous year. This increase while not perhaps alarming is still regrettable in excess of the growth of population in the country. The number of convicts received during the year was 476. Of those released 350 were on the expiry of sentence, two escaped, eight died and 53 were pardoned. It is explained that a few were pardoned in view of the near approach of death, and that the death rate was not so surprisingly low as would appear from the statistical table, though it was very moderate indeed. Evidently the health of the convicts does not materially suffer from their confinement.

If cost on the average \$232.87 to maintain these convicts, over and above the sums earned by them, or \$375 each in gross. If we might make a comparison with the law-abiding population it will be readily seen how great is the cost of crime. Many an honest working man receives not more than a dollar a day during the working days of the year, and on this manages to maintain himself, a wife and perhaps three children. A single penitentiary convict costs \$65 a year more than the sum thus earned by the honest laborer.

A notable feature is that the penitentiary prisoners are mostly young men. There are very few women in the penitentiaries of Canada. Of the total population imprisoned in those institutions, 1,446 in number 159 are under 20 years of age 654 additional are under 30 and 357 more are under 40. This gives a total of 1,170 under 40 years of age. The figures show conclusively that it is almost invariably in youth that the first steps in a criminal career are taken. Of 11 convicts sent to Dorchester during the year from Prince Edward Island the average age was slightly under 22 years and this notwithstanding that one of the number was 42 years old.

The number of pardons seems large, and in recent years the frequent exercise of the pardoning power has come under discussion in the public press. The 53 released from the penitentiaries by pardon last year was not, however in excess of the average during the last five year period. The highest number pardoned out during that term was 73 in 1894-5 and the lowest 43 in 1893-4. It will be seen that the practice of successive governments has been along the same general lines.

The county judgeship for Queens County has been vacant since the 7th of May, during the busiest season of the year and as yet we are not informed when an appointment is to be made. If a judge is merely ill or absent another may be deputed to discharge his duties, but when a vacancy occurs by death no such remedy is available. The court for Queens is the most important county court in the Province, and the duties of the position were thought sufficiently onerous a few years ago to call for an increase in the salary. Now the position is kept open for a period of nearly two months, as if it were a matter of very small consequence. In the meantime suitors are delayed and annoyed.

A writer in the Scientific American argues that the fuel for the future in warships will be petroleum and not coal. This writer points out that ships can only take in coal at sea in time of dead calm, while if oil were used the fuel could be towed in a tank ship and the war vessel could supply herself in time of storm or even when running at full speed, by pumping the oil through a flexible hose. When once ships' furnaces are prepared to burn petroleum fuel the costly coaling stations now maintained

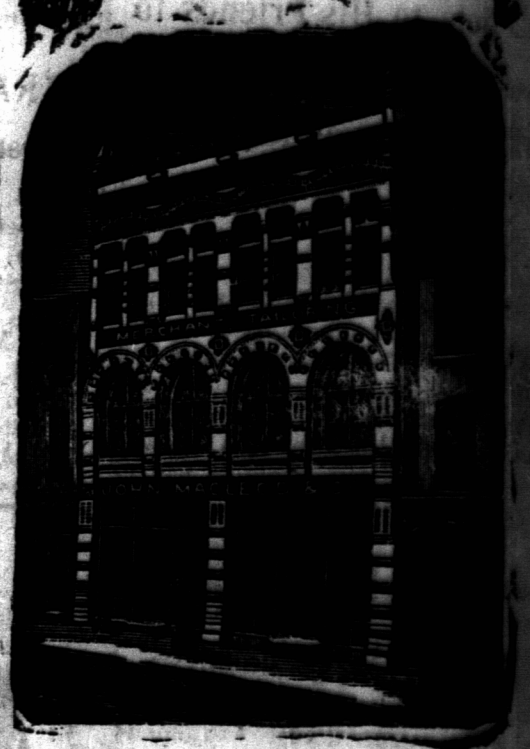
