MR. ROBERT A. TRENAMAN passed to his rest at Rock Island, Illinois, one of its most respected citizens. Deceased was born at Charlottetown, P. E. Island, in the year 1821, and died at the home of his son, John M. Trenaman, 619 Sixth Street, Rock Island, Illinois, on Monday, Aug. 21st, 1899. He was a son of the late John Trenaman, of Charlottetown, and is survived by two sons, John M. and Robert M. Trenaman, also by two sisters, Mrs. Wm. and Mrs. John Stumbles, of Charlottetown, P. E. Island.

AT the meeting of the National Fraternal Congress held this week in Chicago, Dr. Oronhyatekha, the Supreme Chief Ranger, was on Thursday last unanimously elected President of that body. Active preparations are being made by the head office authorities for the proper representation of the order at Exhibition Park during the progress of Canada's Greatest Fair. The membership is still growing, and now stands at 150,000, with a surplus on the 1st inst. of over \$3,500,000. It is the intention of the Supreme Executive Council to hold a reception at their pavilion at the Exhibition grounds on Saturday, the 2nd of September, when it is expected that a large number of the brethren will be present.—Toronto Globe.
