## SKATING AT PRINCE'S CLUB.

The Ice Hockey Championship.—Final London Canadians Defeat Prince's Club.

The deciding match in the series of games played for the possession of the handsome champion cup took place on Saturday evening at Prince's Club, Knightbridge, when a large and distinguished company was present, including Earl of Portarlington, Sir Humphrey Hay and Lady Hay, Lady Walton, Hon. Algy Grosvenor, Mr. Grant Lawson, M. P., Sir Walter Bartlett, General Napier Campbell, Sir Simon Stuart, the Duchess of Bedford, and Hon. Mrs. Haig. Either side had their best available team on hand, with the result that a very fast and scientific game was witnessed. Players:—

PRINCE'S CLUB.—H. Bishop (goal), C. H. Hannaford and B. Patten (backs), C. F. Clayton, and C. Napier.

The home side were seen to better advantage in the opening stages of play, and C. F. Clayton very soon succeeded in breaking through the others' defence and scoring, while Napier, scoring twice in the first half, they changed over with Prince's leading by three goals to nothing. The pace was very fast in the second half but here the Canadians shone, and with plenty of vigor thrown into the game, were seen scoring points. Sullivan getting a couple in the first quarter of an hour, and after Clayton had placed his side further ahead, a third scored from Edgar. Just before time was called Sullivan again got through, and with four all it was decided to play an extra five minutes each way. The Canadians were better stayers than their rivals, and four times got through, Hingston being responsible for three, while Sullivan got a single, the game ending in favour of the Canadians by eight goals to three.—The Sporting Life, Mar. 30 1903.

London Canadians Win the Ice Hockey Championship.—On Saturday the London Canadians, who organized late last autumn, defeated Prince's Club in the final tie of the Ice Hockey Championship, and thus won the champion cup. The other members of the league are Cambridge University, Prince's Club, and the Amateur Skating Club. Three of the winning team, Messrs. Edgar, McKenzie, and Carr-Harris, come from Ontario, Mr. Edgar being a son of the late Sir James Edgar, at one time Speaker of the Canadian Commons, and Mr. McKenzie, a nephew of the Dominion's first Liberal Premier. Mr. Hingston is a son of Sir William Hingston, of Montreal, and Mr. Sullivan's father is Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island. The cup which was won on Saturday will shortly be on exhibition at the Canadian Offices, 17, Victoria Street.—The Canadian Gazette April 2nd., 1903.

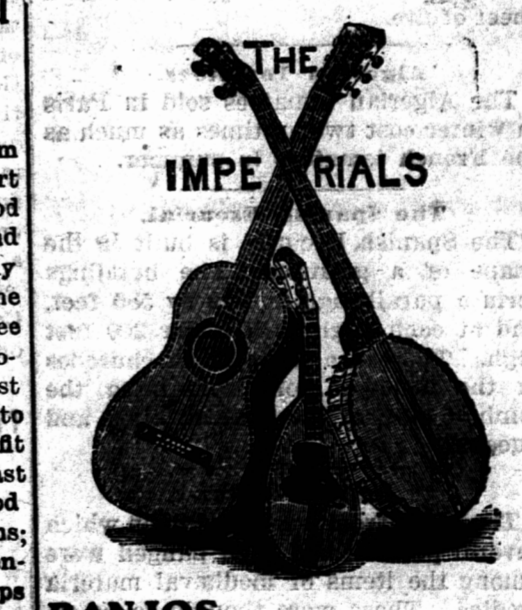
