Abbies And Crystals Battle To Draw

JUNIOR ABBIES HAND RANGERS 4-3 DEFEAT

Winners Gain Early Lead And Then Turn Back Closing Rallies Of Losers

Outsmarting and outplaying their opponents for two periods to garner a two-goal lead, Harry Richardson's Junior Abbies last night broke the spell the Rangers held over them this season when they sent the city league favorites down to a 4-3 defeat in a game that was fast and action-crammed throughout. The result left the three teams tied in the standing with a win apiece.

Led by Reg Flannigan who shot the Abbies into an early lead that was never overtaken, and then giving the Abbies what proved to be the winning goal on a penalty shot the winners outplayed their opponents thoroughly for two periods and then went back on the defensive in the final session to hold the Rangers in check. At one time in the second period Abbies led 4-1 but although the losers drew the count to 4-3 early in the final session on brilliant goals by Worth and McKinnon, they could not pierce or break through the defensive measures employed by the winners.

Abbies were masters of the Rangers last night. Playing a somewhat cautious but mighty effective style of game Abbies were content to let the Rangers carry the play to them and then break away to themselves on fast sorties into Ranger territory. They waited for the breaks that came and although in justice to the losers that they weren't up to their usual form, it would have taken a mighty smart team to defeat the Abbies last night, judging by the manner in which they backchecked and took opposing players out of the play.

Abbies' defensive system in the first period proved hard to penetrate and Rangers resorted to long drives, but the Abbies were clearing well and stopping the incoming Rangers regularly. Abbies took a 2-0 lead before the five-minute mark had been reached, Flannigan accounting for the first when his wicked drive from the blue line fooled DeBlouis completely. Not 20 minutes later Darragh broke fast from a Ranger attack, rounded the defence and then slipped the disc to Dowling who batted it in.

Rangers pressed dangerously when McDonald and McClintock were waved for roughing, but they weren't finishing their plays around the net. However, with the teams at full strength Rangers got back in the running, Levi Blacquiere picking a loose rubber in front of the Abbie net to score easily.

For the remainder of the session it was a nip and tuck affair with Rangers winning off dangerous Abbie attacks when McDonald drew his second penalty of the period. Abbies outplayed and outscored Rangers 2-1 again in the second session. Close checking spoiled the game from a spectator's viewpoint, but proved mighty effective for the Abbies as they halted Rangers regularly to break away on fast, two and three man breaks.

Darragh shot the Abbies into a 3-1 lead at 6:27 of the period, breaking in on DeBlouis alone after a three-man attack had been temporarily halted. Two minutes and two seconds later Abbies were awarded a penalty shot and Flannigan scored his second goal on another wicked drive.

Rangers couldn't break through despite herculean efforts but a penalty to Flannigan saw a Ranger gang attack realize, "Buffer" Worth batting the disc in after battling off three Abbie players.

Benny Lynch New Flyweight Champion

LONDON, Jan. 19.—Benny Lynch of Scotland won the world's flyweight championship today by out-pointing Small Montana of Mania in their 15 round title fight.

Lynch, holder of the British crown scaled 111 pounds, six ounces for the bout. Montana, hitherto recognized as champion by the National Boxing Association of the United States, weighed 107 pounds, ten ounces.

Thirteen thousand fans turned out for the scrap. Lynch carried the fight throughout, chasing the faster Montana to all corners of the ring, although never able to land with his knockout punch.

Lynch aggressively pursued the dancing Filipino target and bombarded him with rights and lefts. He worked better at close quarters than the shifty Montana. In the sixth, a left hook caught Montana on the jaw and drove him into the ropes.

The 14th and 15th rounds had fans out of their seats as Montana attempted to carry the fight, particularly in the 14th round, when he stopped his dancing tactics and drove in with both fists swinging. Lynch willingly mixed with him, however, and slowed the Filipino down with a left to the jaw.

Lynch back away from his rival only once during the fight. In the 15th Montana let both fists go at the body, and crossed two hard rights to the jaw, forcing the husky Scot to cover up.

After the fight, Montana said he thought he had won. "But I'm not going to argue," he said. "The referee says Lynch—and that goes for me."

Leafs-Bruins Game Ends In Wild Free-for-all As Toronto Team Wins 6-2

BOSTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Hopelessly beaten the Boston Bruins tonight before a packed crowd of 15,000 at the Boston Garden.

The disorders broke out in the third period when Leafs had a 5-1 lead. Hooley Smith started wrestling with Red Horner and half a dozen other players joined in. Order finally was restored and Smith, Horner, Ray Gettiffe and Jimmy Fowler were given major penalties.

Leafs started building their one-sided lead during the first two minutes of play when Bill Kendall registered an unassisted. Then late in the period Hooley Smith was penalized and before he came back rookie Gordon Drillon from Moncton had fired in two more goals.

Drillon made it three in a row and 4-0 for Leafs in the next session with another goal that he scored after taking a pass from Harvey Jackson. There was no further scoring in the period.

Gettiffe and Bill Cowley, who used to play hockey in the Maritime, combined for the first Boston goal, Gettiffe scoring from close in. Bill Thoms went through alone to give its four goal lead again, but Gettiffe came back near the close of the period with an unassisted goal. A few minutes later Red Horner ended the scoring with the assist of Davidson.

WINGS WHIP HAWKS
DETROIT, Jan. 19.—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings overcame the Chicago Indian sign tonight and whipped the Black Hawks 7-2 for their first hometown win of the National Hockey League season from the sectional fall.

The league's leading scorer, 146-pound Larry Aurie, led the champions to victory before 10,000 spectators. He scored two goals and was credited with two assists. The game ended in the greatest scoring rampage seen here this year, Detroit scoring four goals and Chicago one in the final four minutes. The seven Red Wing goals made the game their highest scoring effort this season, and put them ahead of the Hawks in their series for the first time.

Syd Howe almost matched Aurie's record, scoring twice and aiding in one of Aurie's goals. Howe turned in the most brilliant individual piece of the evening for the first goal of the game, skating solo nearly the length of the ice in the first period.

Pete Palangio scored alone at the end of the second period for the first Blackhawk goal, and Marty Buck knocked the final goal past Normie Smith at 19:51 of the third on passes from Art Wiebe and Andy Blair.

Hec Kilrea scored Detroit's final counter, his first goal of the season, and his brother Wally's goal opened the mad dashes to the nets in the closing minutes. Only 15 seconds separated goals by Howe and Aurie in that period.

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—(CP)—Montreal Canadiens fought New York Americans to a 1-1 overtime tie in a National Hockey League match tonight before 12,000 fans.

The deadlock enabled Rangers to draw two points ahead of the third place Boston Bruins in the United States division and sent Habitant seven points up on the idle Montreal Maroons at the top of the Canadian set.

Little Aurel Joliat, aging but brilliant left-winger of the Frenchmen, sent his team into an early lead mid-way through the opening period as he slammed a hot backhander between Davie Kerr's legs on a double relay from another pair of veterans, Howe Morenz and Johnny Gagnon.

Rangers were unable to get the equalizer until early in the third session when pinch-hitting Butch Keeling smacked a double pass from Murray Murdoch and Phil Watson past Wilf Cude in the Canadian net.

Trio Elected To Baseball's Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Napoleon Lajoie, Tris Speaker and Cy Young, a trio of the greatest diamond heroes of the past, today were voted positions in baseball's permanent hall of fame at Cooperstown, N. Y.

The trio, winners of a poll taken from the membership of the Baseball Writers Association of America, will join the "original immortals," Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner, Christy Mathewson and Walter Johnson, who were elected in the first poll last year.

Bronze plaques of the "original immortals" already have been hung in the museum at Cooperstown, birthplace of baseball. Those of Lajoie, Speaker and Young will be placed immediately.

Lajoie, who batted .300 for 15 years in the majors when such an average was a mark seldom reached, led the voting in the second poll. The speedy Frenchman, who served service with the old Philadelphia Phillies, Athletics and Cleveland, received 168 out of a possible 201 votes. Speaker, who also reached his greatest stardom in a Cleveland uniform, ranked second with 165 votes as against 153 for Young, one of the greatest iron man pitchers of them all.

Seventy-five per cent of the total, or 151 votes, was necessary to election to the Hall of Fame. Grover Cleveland Alexander, former Chicago Cub and St. Louis Cardinal pitching star now reported near death, was just 26 votes shy of election with 125.

All three of those named today are still living.

Smythe Goes 'Top Hat'

BOSTON, Jan. 19.—Con Smythe, the Toronto Maple Leafs' publicity-wise manager, created a furore in the Boston Garden tonight when he arrived in the formal tuxedo of a cutaway coat, striped trousers and a silk topper. Two policemen were assigned as his guard of honor and also to discourage any of the hockey patrons who were in a bad mood.

Smythe explained that he was eager to provide professional hockey with some "much needed refinement" and Weston Adams, President of the Bruins, tried to co-operate with him by wearing full dress and a top hat that lacked the Smythe glister.

Hereabouts, the dapper boss of the Leafs has a record of bitter warfare with hostile Bruin fans and Manager Art Ross of the Boston Club that dates back several years. Until tonight, the stubborn Smythian jaw always protruded belligerently in Boston Gardens.

Local Team, After Losing Early Lead Earn Draw In Last 2 Seconds Of Overtime

After playing 10 minutes overtime last night the Crystals were still leading Abbies by one goal for the Island championship when they fought to a five-all draw at the Crystal Rink. The game was rough at times and nine penalties were handed out.

Turning on the heat in the second period the Crystals cut down the Charlottetown Abbies' early lead to finally overhaul them just five seconds before regulation time to give the fans the best game of hockey seen here in years. 600 fans roared themselves hoarse as the teams catching each other short-handed by penalties played four and five men up the ice. Ray Stull again stood out for the Abbies while Chick Gallant, playing the last two periods and overtime without relief, scored three goals and had an assist on a fourth.

The Abbies had the edge in the first period and after five minutes of play "Snag" Stewart took Saunders' pass to open the scoring. McKinnon then drew a penalty but the Crystals could not beat Stull. At the 15 minute mark Whitlock took Stewart's pass to beat Larkins from close in. Two minutes later Kane soloed through the faltering Crystals to make it 3-0 for the Abbies, but Chick Gallant came right back to beat Stull after streaking out from behind the Abbie net to snare a loose puck.

The Crystals turned on the heat in the second canto with Chick Gallant again streaking through the Abbies defense to sink a hard corner drive that the Charlottetown goalie never saw, after one minute of play. Chick then drew a penalty for holding and the Abbies sent four men up. Whelan grabbed Cudmore's pass to beat Larkins at the four minute mark. Two minutes later Whelan went to the cooler and Chick countered with a solo rush that found the twines. The Abbies took two more penalties but the Crystals were over anxious. Stull rose to great heights to save dangerous drives while Larkins harry received a shot in the final half of the period which ended 4-3 for the visitors.

The third period found the Abbies fighting hard to hold their one goal lead while the Crystals sent wave after wave of players into offensive zone. The game was rough, with the Crystals taking one penalty while Charlottetown took three. The Abbies relieved the pressure by shooting the puck up the ice. It looked as though the Abbies had the game when with five seconds to play Jack Schurman, who had been closely watched all evening, broke away to take Gallant's pass for the tying count. The Crystals kept the offensive in the overtime and at the two minute mark Charlie Cahill took Harry Dickie's pass to put the Crystals ahead for the first time during the game. The home team then went on defence and it looked as if they would stave off all attempts when Whelan took Cudmore's pass to beat Larkins with only two seconds of play remaining.
