**Wool Shipments**

In the fiscal year 1921 wool export shipments from Canada totaled in value \$2,168,256 and in 1920 \$5,472,256. In 1921, 7,128,065 pounds went to the United States; 130,159 to Newfoundland in the year previous \$,559,682 pounds were exported to the United States, 195,081 to Britain and 29,964 to Newfoundland. Canada has, however, always been the principal market, and consumer of her own wool products, and still remains so. It is worthy of note that up to the middle of October sales of the Canadian Cooperative Wool Growers to the Canadian trade exceeded the total sales of last season by some 500,000 pounds.

**CUBA IS LOOTED OF \$9,000,000**

HAVANA, March 15.—Information secured by treasury department agents who investigated thefts from bonded warehouses of unclaimed shipments from the United States and other foreign countries has been laid before President Zayas. It showed that ninety per cent of the contents of the cases stored in two warehouses had disappeared. The goods were to be sold at auction on March 1, to collect tariff duties and taxes estimated to amount to several million dollars. An extension of this decree was made March 2 for three months.

Treasury department officials said only a complete inventory of the warehouses would reveal the extent to which foreign goods have been stolen. During the brief congestion in summer of 1920, fifty-three special bonded warehouses were filled with consignments of merchandise. Eleven of the official
