May Now Wear First Class Uniform

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 8.—The cable announcement from London that the King has granted to Hon. P. C. Larkin, High Commissioner, the right to wear at court, the first class civil uniform instead of the second class, as worn since 1880, came as news today to the Department of External Affairs. They had not heard anything about it but, in any event, it was stated that the announcement has nothing to do with Canada's much discussed status.

The question of the High Commissioner's status in London has been giving Mr. Larkin concern, and some time ago in the table of precedence he was moved up. It is presumed that his right to wear the first class civil uniform now comes in sequence of his recognition.

CANCER CURE BY RADIUM

(By British United Press) LONDON, Feb. 8.—In a few years radium (says the "Lancet") is recognized as the most effective form of treatment for certain forms of cancer.

"Surgery (says the article) has been slow to admit radium into its armory for combating the ravages of cancer, but year by year the evidence grows that radium is of real utility.

"It is our belief that this evidence will accumulate at an increasing rate, and that it will not be many years before radium is recognized to be the best form of treatment for some forms of cancer, with the result that some forms of operation now frequently practised will fall almost into disuse.

"The supply of radium available in this country has never been large and those who have used it in a scientific manner have been few, but the result of their work is beginning to make itself felt."

leave the able and wise heads of these organizations to deal with Mr. Veniot in their own good time and in their good way. He denied most emphatically that conservatives had anything to do with forcing the question upon the C. N. R. for what had been done in that connection. The Boards of Trade in question were responsible. In discussing status he said most emphatically as a lawyer familiar with international law that Canada was not a sovereign power and never would be as long as she remained part of the British Federal Empire and he did not believe it was desirable that there should be any change in relations.

In respect of a sound policy of immigration settlement he was greatly disappointed with the speech of Mr. Forke which revealed incompetency and lack of constructive ideas. What was wanted was a round table conference of government officials, provincial ministers and officers, railway colonization heads, and men of prominence in various influential capacities. The minister would find willing assistance and co-operation everywhere.

We want, he said, to retain the population by a large and varied influx of British people. Why Mr. Veniot should raise the reciprocity issue now when there are no signs in the Liberal ranks or in the United States to rescue that issue from its present limbo he could not understand.

At very considerable length he spoke of the industrial situation which he described as regrettable, coal, iron and steel, the manufacture of textiles and rope works in the Maritimes were in a very poor condition. The speech from the throne contained no indication of a fiscal policy to remedy such a serious state of affairs.

The speech of the Hon. Dr. Tolmie was as usual full of meat, and local problems in B. C. and throughout Canada were dealt with in a most practical way. The speech deserves a greater amount of space than is available tonight and will have further consideration tomorrow.

Mr. Loyie (MacDonald) had spoken for a short time when adjournment took place. The Senate which has been busy discussing the speech from the throne since Tuesday of last week has adjourned until the 13th of March.

The question of Dr. Edwards in connection with the recall of the Mexican Consul which helped to fan the flame started by Bishop Fallon and Mr. Marell is being further supplemented from other quarters. A brochure published in New York and entitled "The Mexican People and the Church" is being received by members of the House. It is a very warm attack upon the Roman Catholic Church in Mexico.

The introduction of this Mexican business in Parliament whatever the motive of the mover—calculated to stir up a lot of trouble. It may be relished by some but not viewed very complacently by the great majority.

Distinguished Visitors Hear Senator Hughes

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 8.—Hon. Frank B. Kellogg, United States Secretary of State and Hon. Wm. Phillips, United States Ambassador, occupied seats on the floor of the Senate today while Senator J. J. Hughes was speaking on the address from the throne.

During the presence of these distinguished visitors, Mr. Hughes strongly deprecated the raising of the annexation bogey in Canada. He said he believed Canadians of the present day had no fear of annexation to the United States and paid no attention to the United States attempts to rouse their fears.

Senator Hughes quoted statistics to show that unemployment was greater in the United States than in Canada.

At this stage the distinguished visitors left the Senate for the House of Commons.

Resuming the debate Senator Hughes denounced protection and said it was probably only defensive in one country, and that the United States.

Senator Tanner discussed the St. Lawrence Waterways and hoped it would be considered on National and not sectional grounds.
